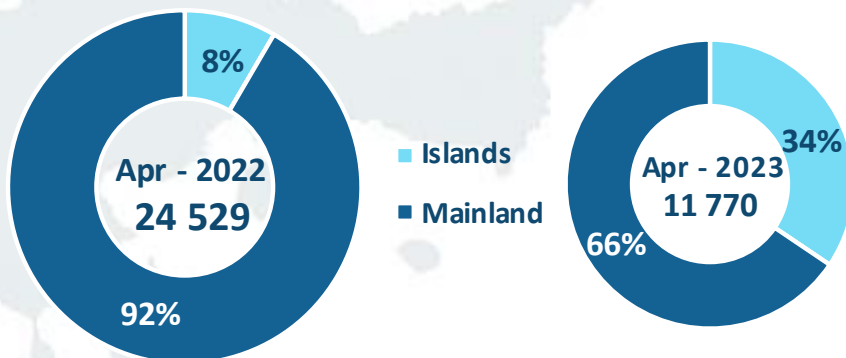

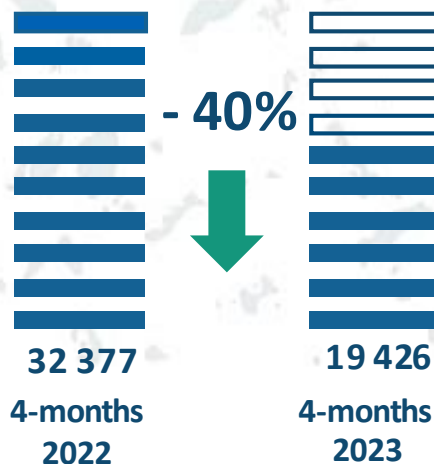

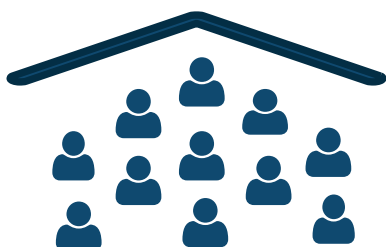

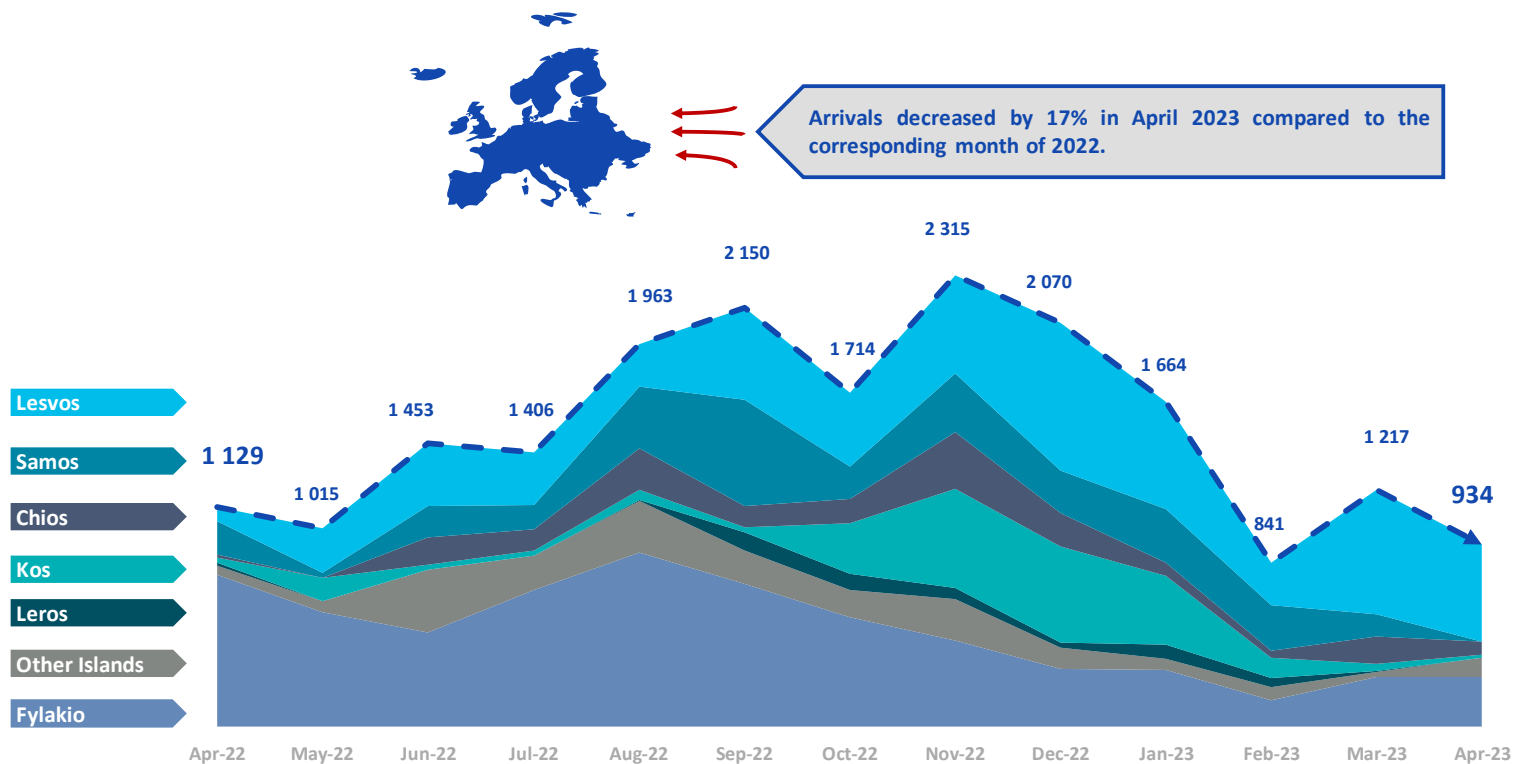


Chart 1. Arrivals April 2022 – April 2023 – See Appendix Table 1

2. Transfers of asylum seekers from the islands to the mainland

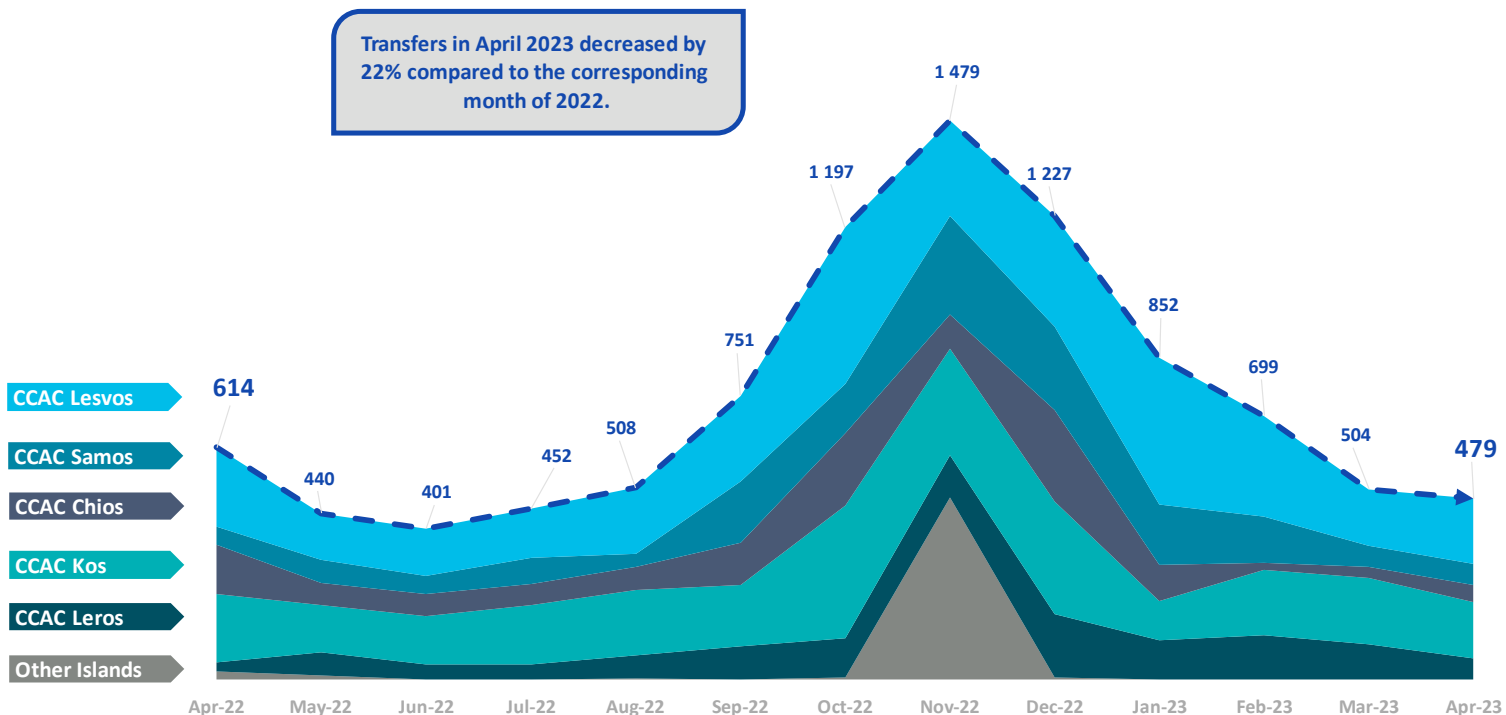


Chart 2. Transfers of asylum seekers from the islands to the mainland April 2022 – April 2023 - See Appendix Table 2

The residents in the islands increased by 85% in April 2023 compared to the corresponding month of 2022.

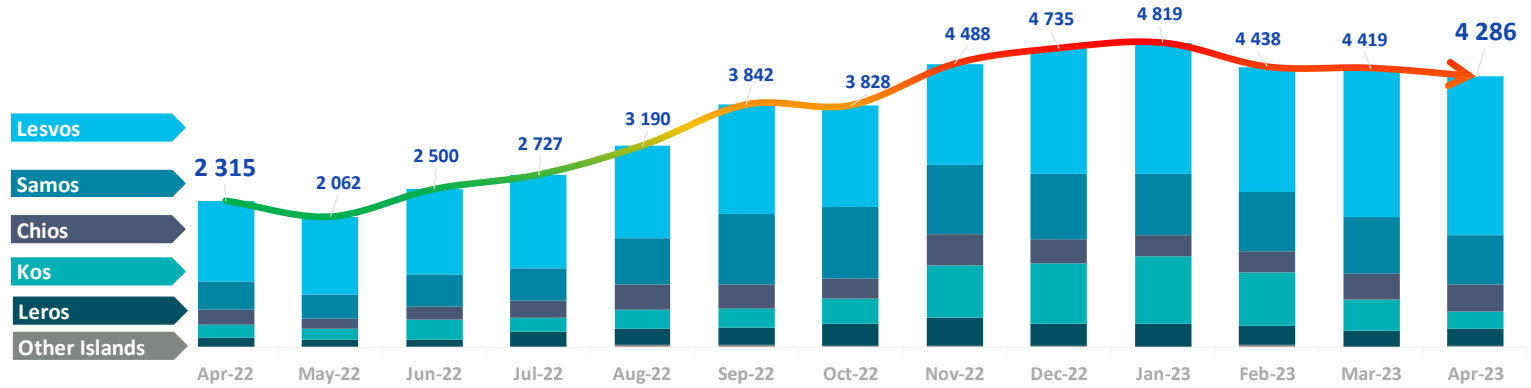


Chart 3. Island Residents in total April 2022 - April 2023 - See Appendix Table 3

The total number of residents decreased by 52% in April 2023 compared to the corresponding month of 2022.

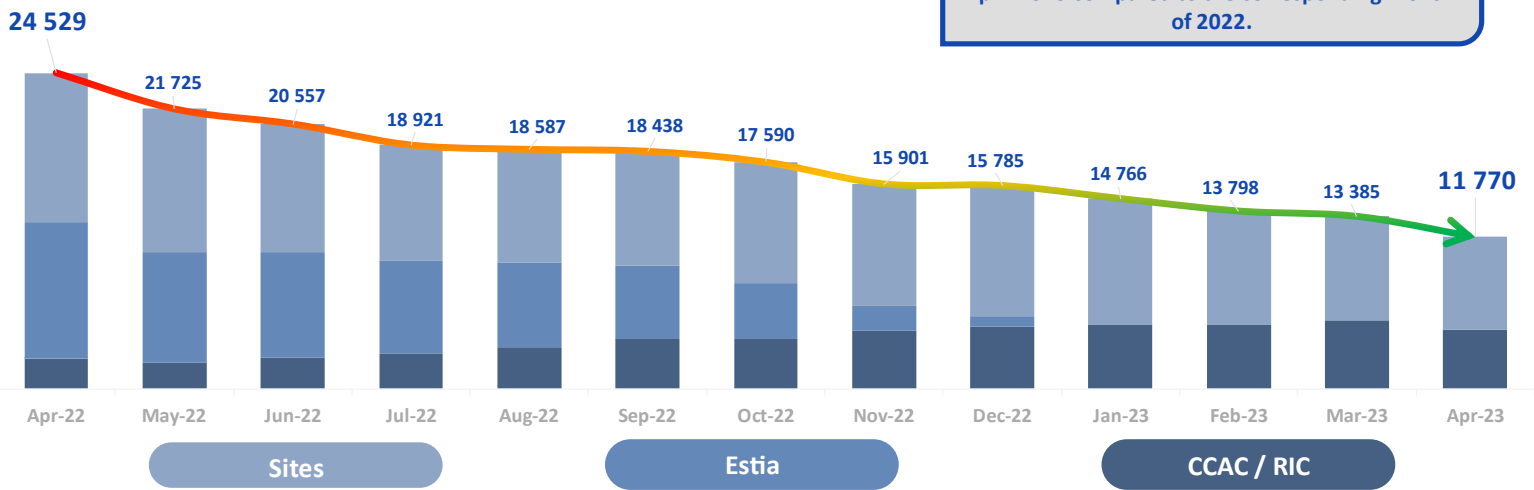
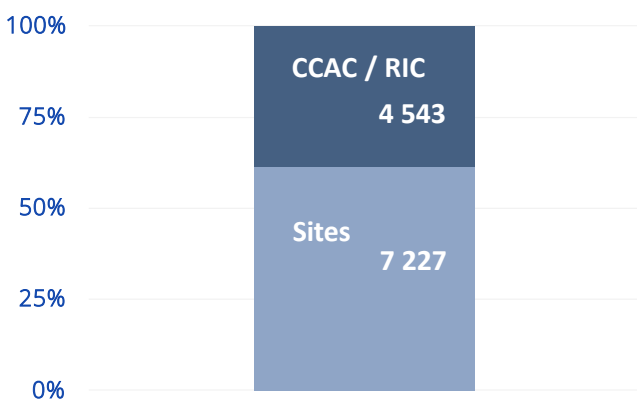
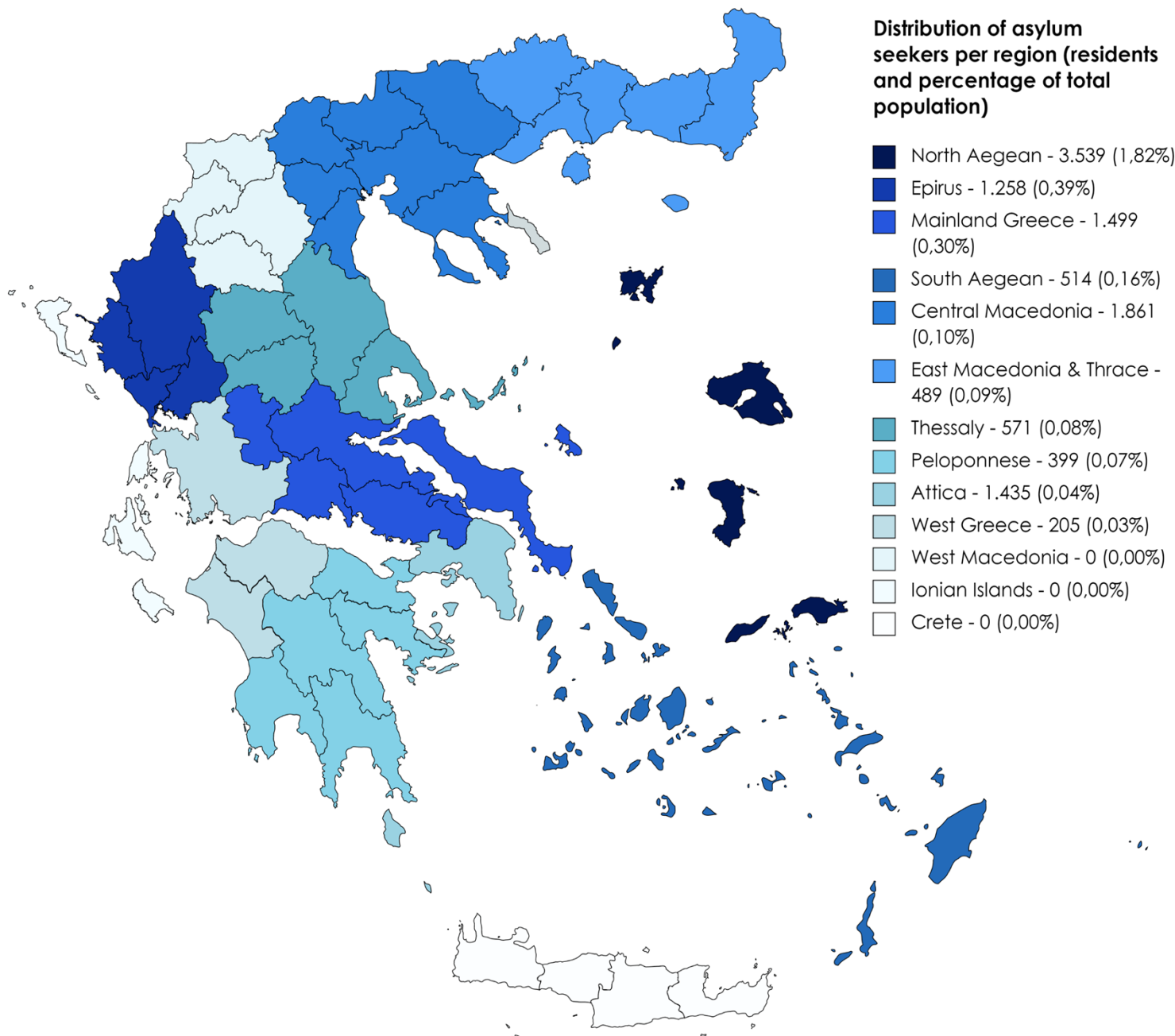


Chart 4. Progress of Residents through time – See Appendix Table 6



The goal of the Government is the equal and fair distribution (1%) of asylum seekers in all the regions of the country, with the exception of the first reception points. There was a general decrease in the number of residents in most regions by 52% (from 24.529 to 11.770) during the last 12 months.

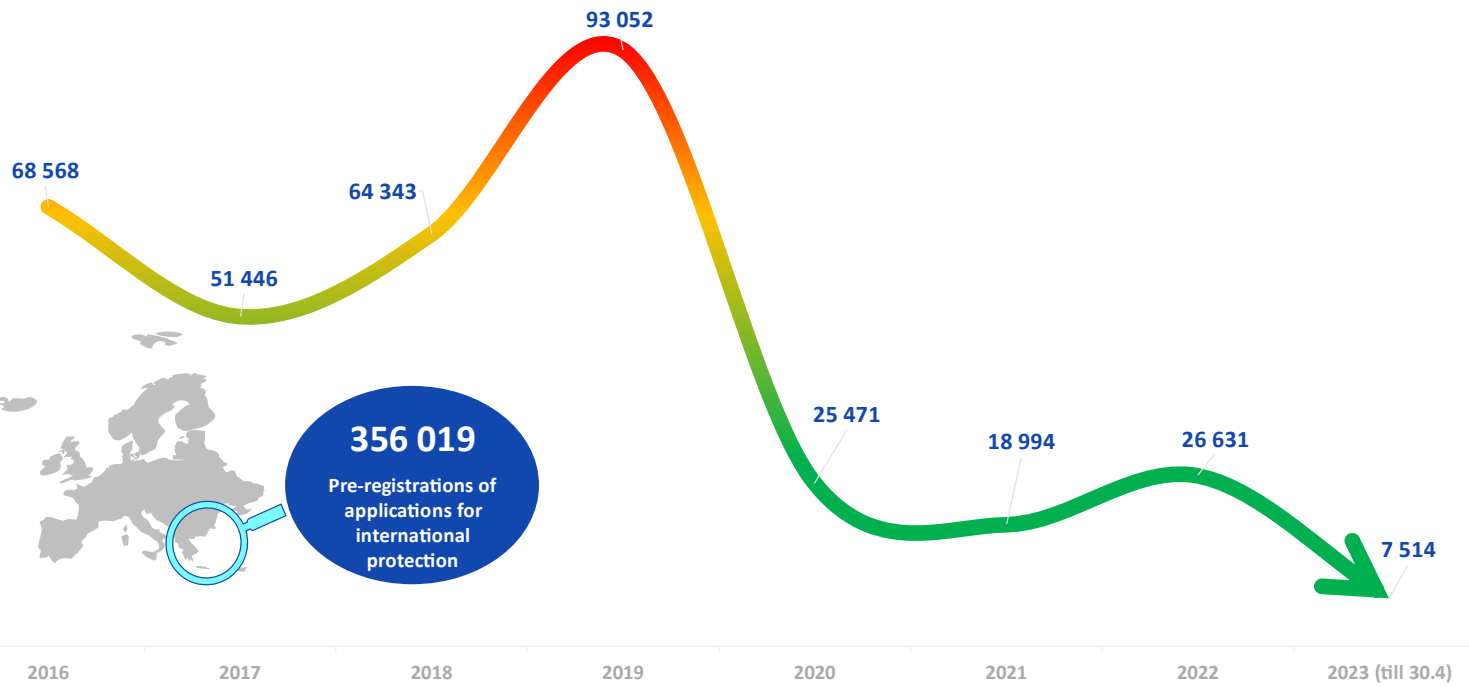

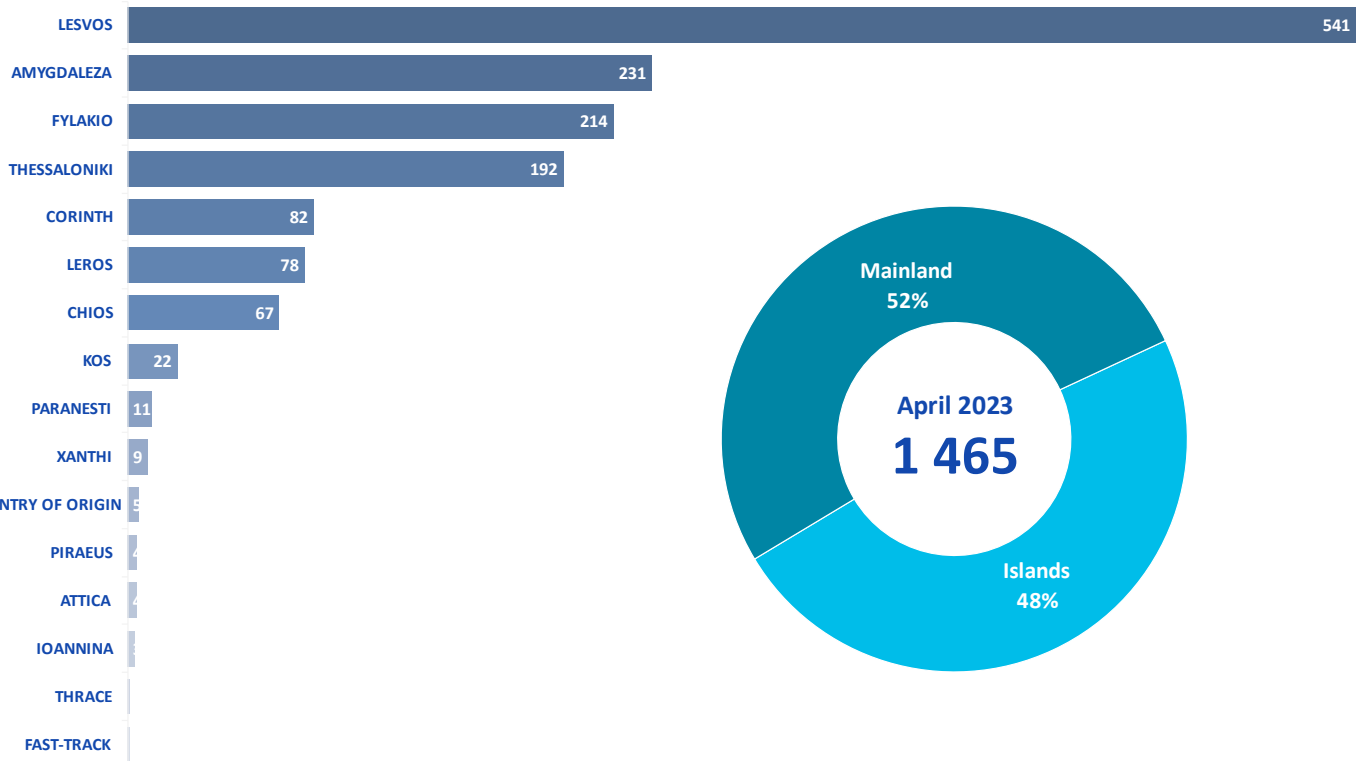


Chart 7. Pre-Registrations of applications per Regional Office or Asylum Unit and per Region for the reference month (April 2023) – See Appendix Table 7b

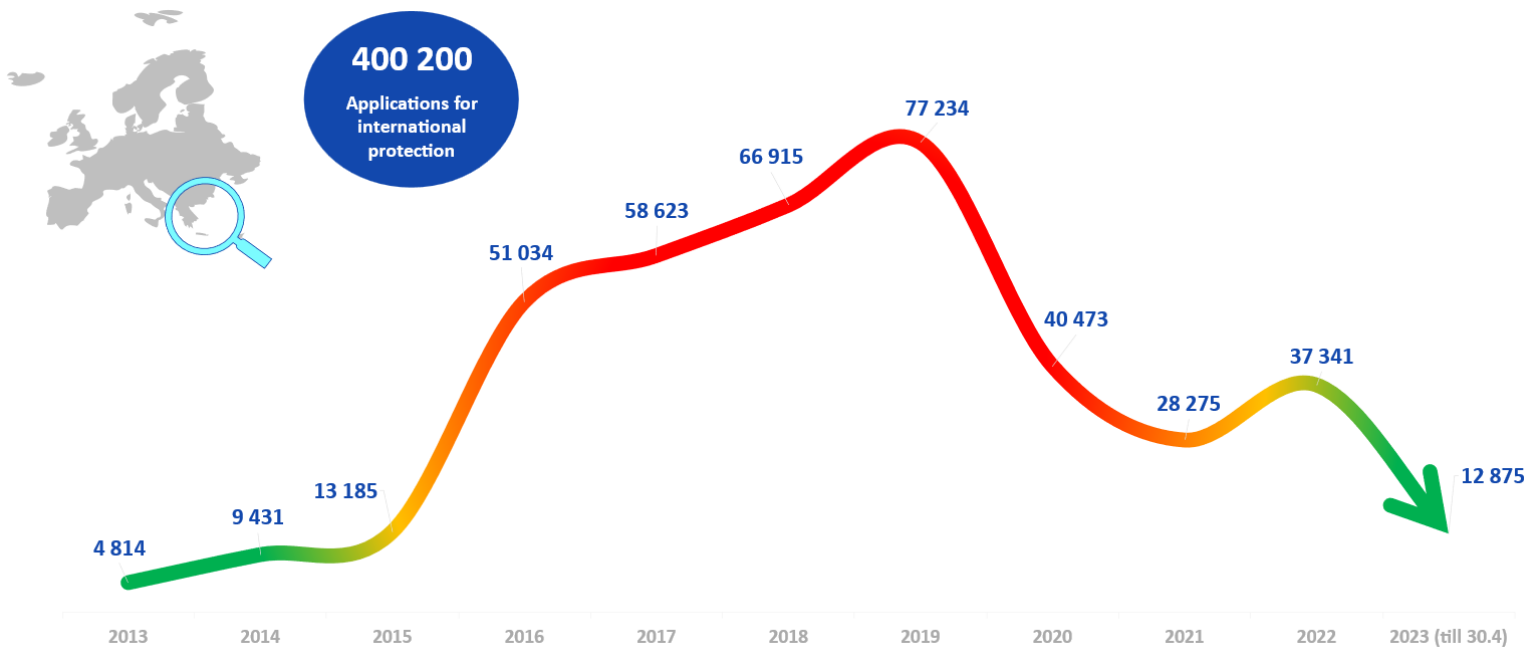


Chart 8. Applications for International Protection per year. For 2023 applications are calculated till the month of reference (April) - See Appendix Table 8a

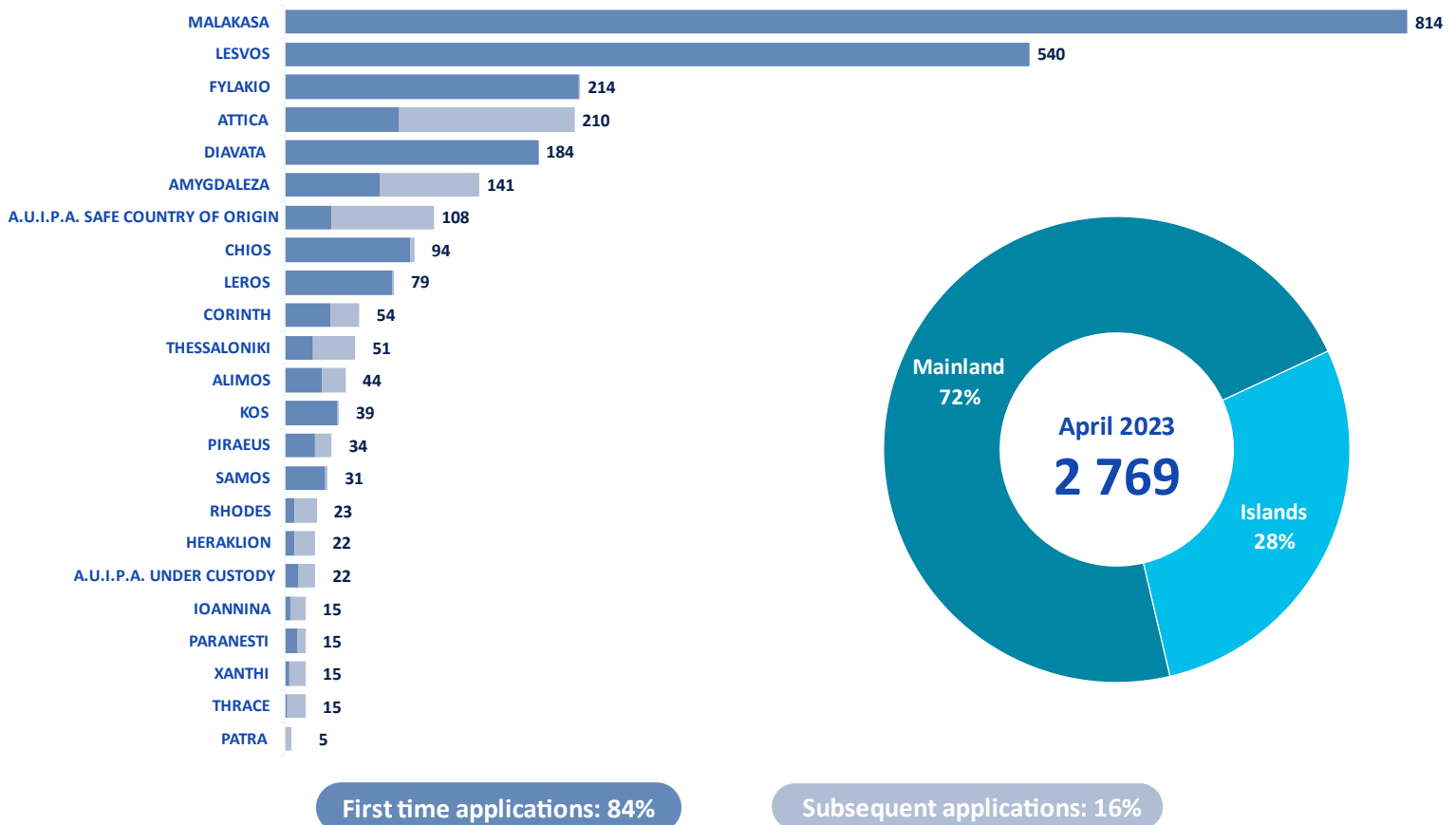

Applications for International Protection increased by 37% in April 2023 compared to the corresponding month of 2022. 80% out of total 44.004 applications from April 2022 till April 2023 was first time applications and 20% subsequent.

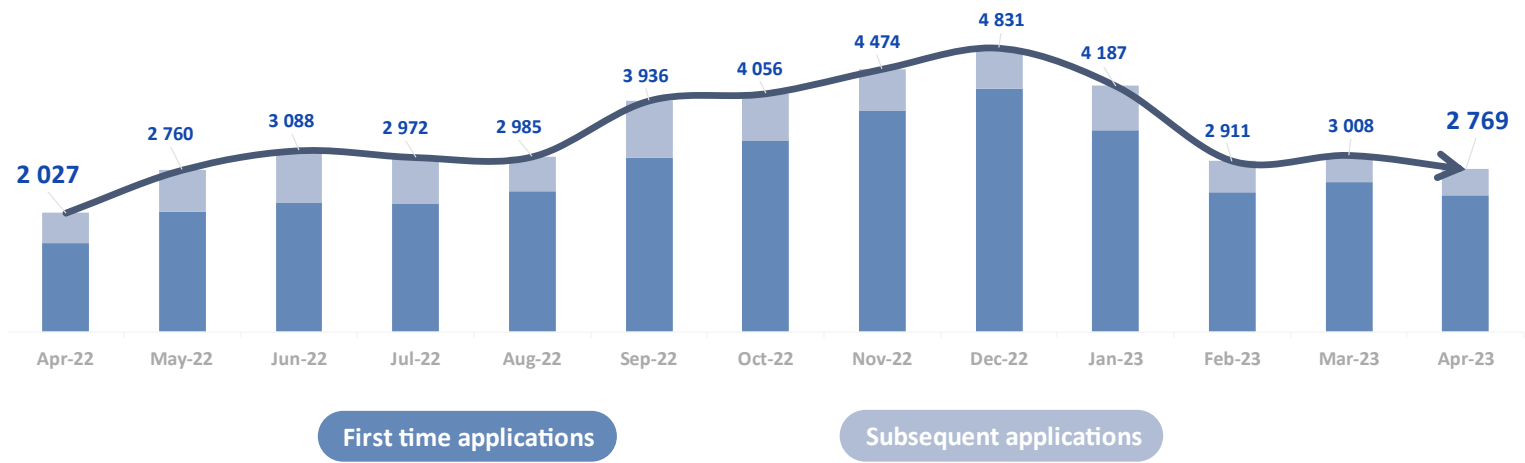


Chart 10. Applications for International Protection per month with distinction between first time and subsequent (April 2022 - April 2023) - See Appendix Table 8c

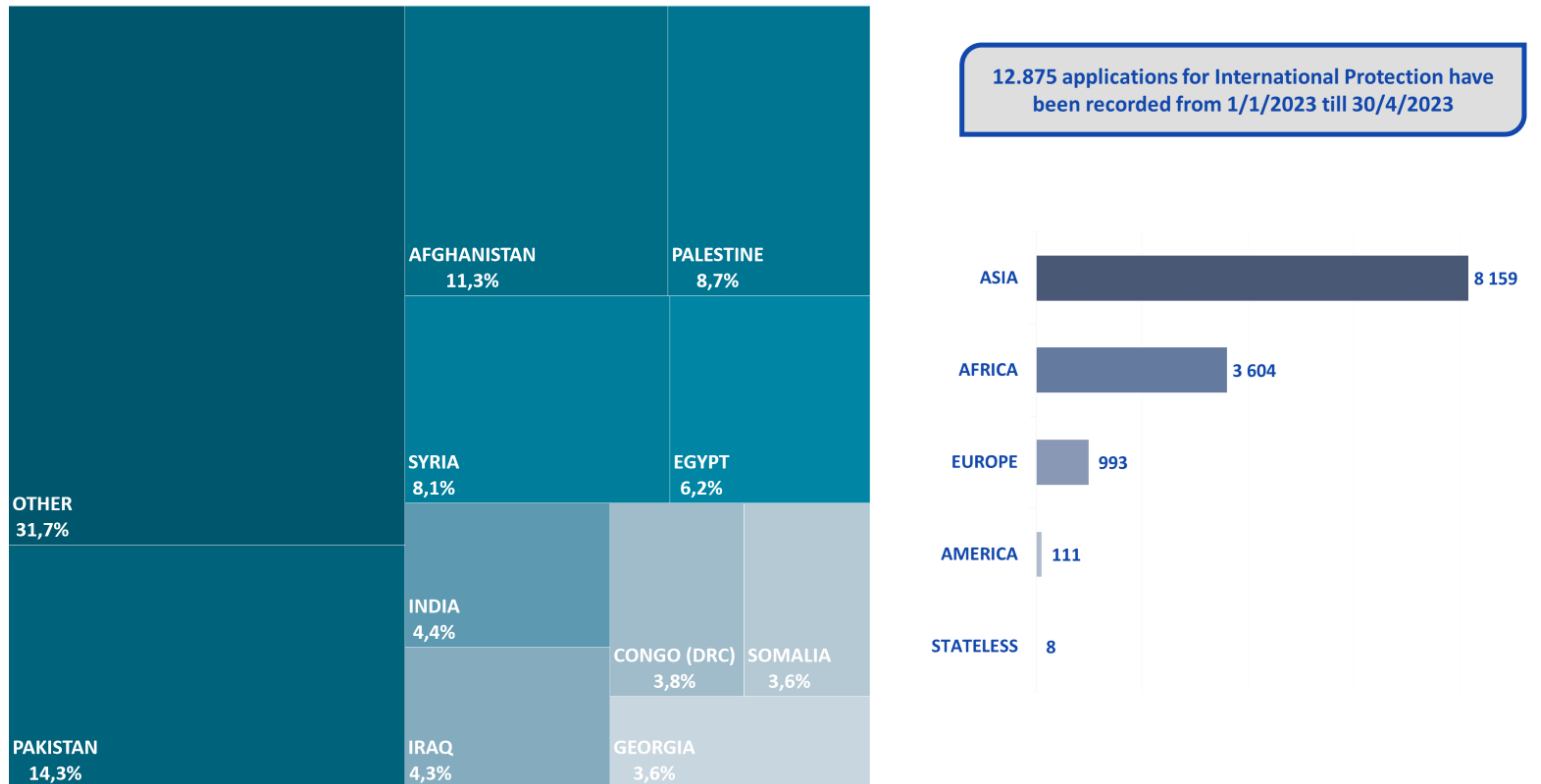


Chart 11. Applications for International Protection 4-months 2023 per Nationality (Top 10 Nationalities and distribution per continent) - See Appendix Table 8d

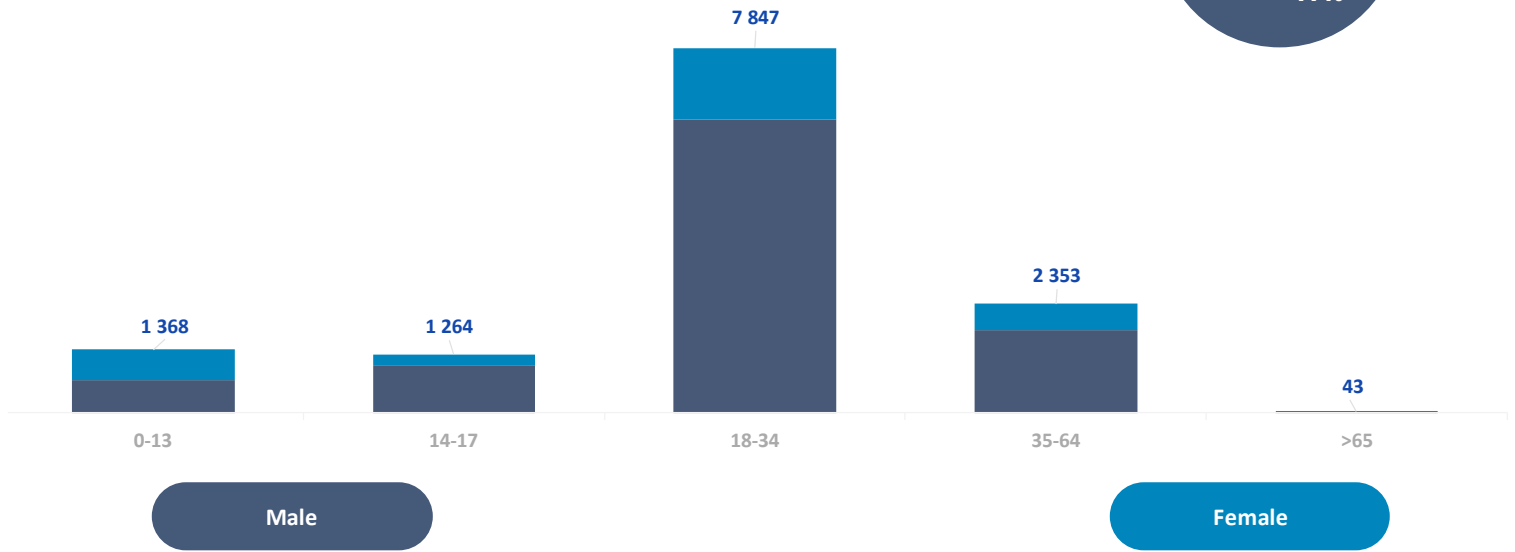
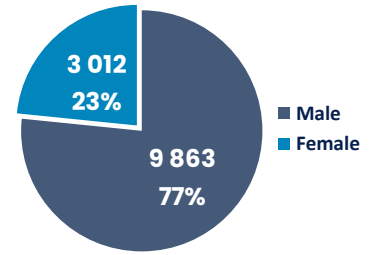


Chart 12. Applications for International Protection 4-months 2023 per gender and age group - See Appendix Table 8e

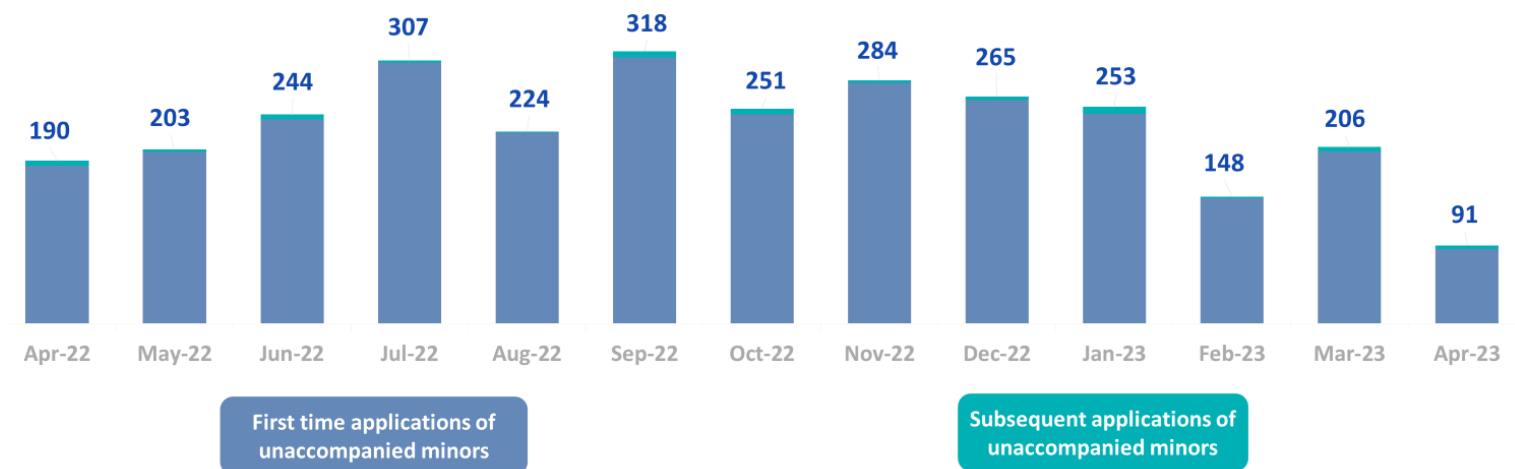
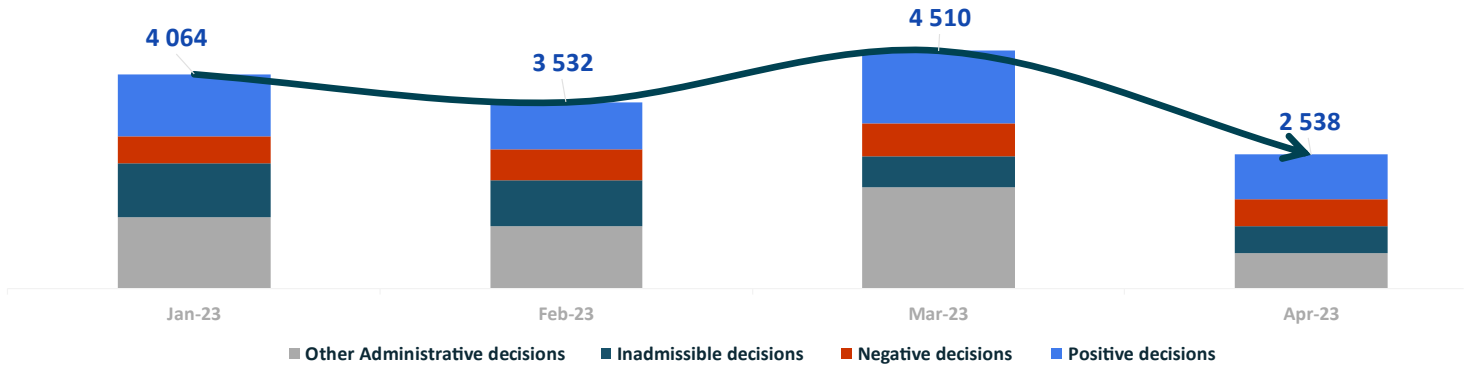
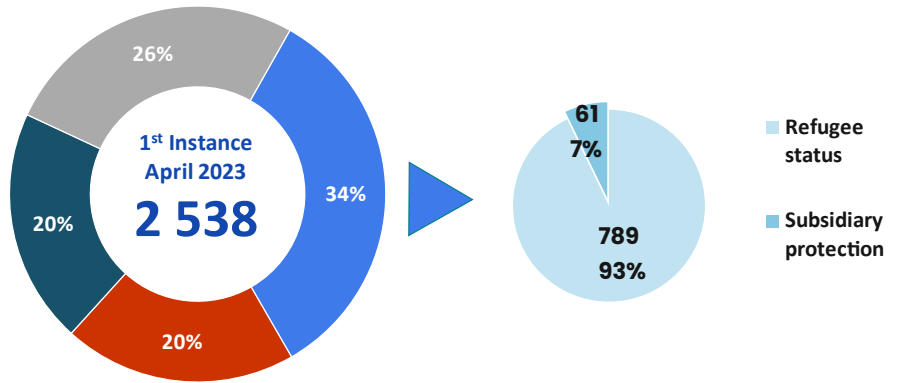

7a. Type of Decisions – 1st Instance

14.644 decisions have been issued in the 1st Instance from 1/1/2023 till 30/4/2023. 29% of them are positive, 36% negative and 35% refers to other administrative decisions.

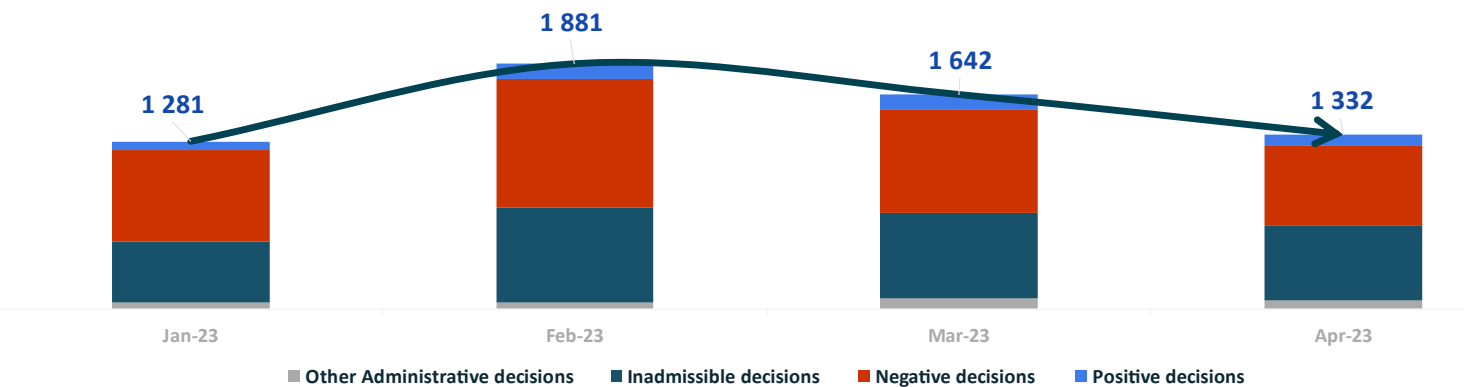
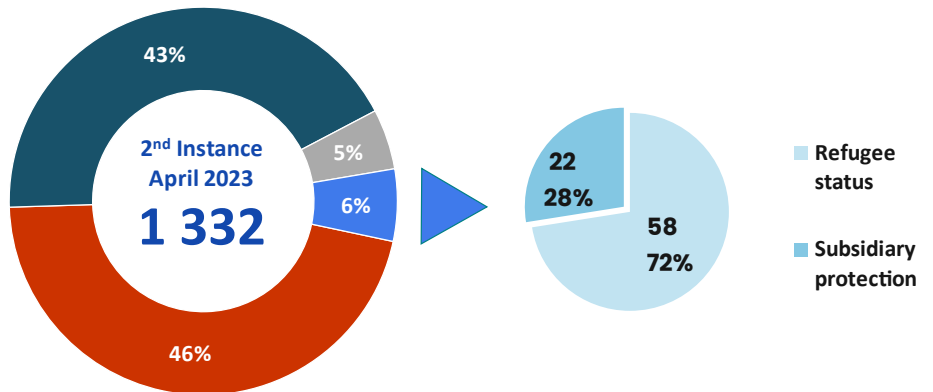


Chart 15. 2nd Instance Decisions per month and type for 2023 and for the month of reference (April 2023). - See Appendix Table 9b

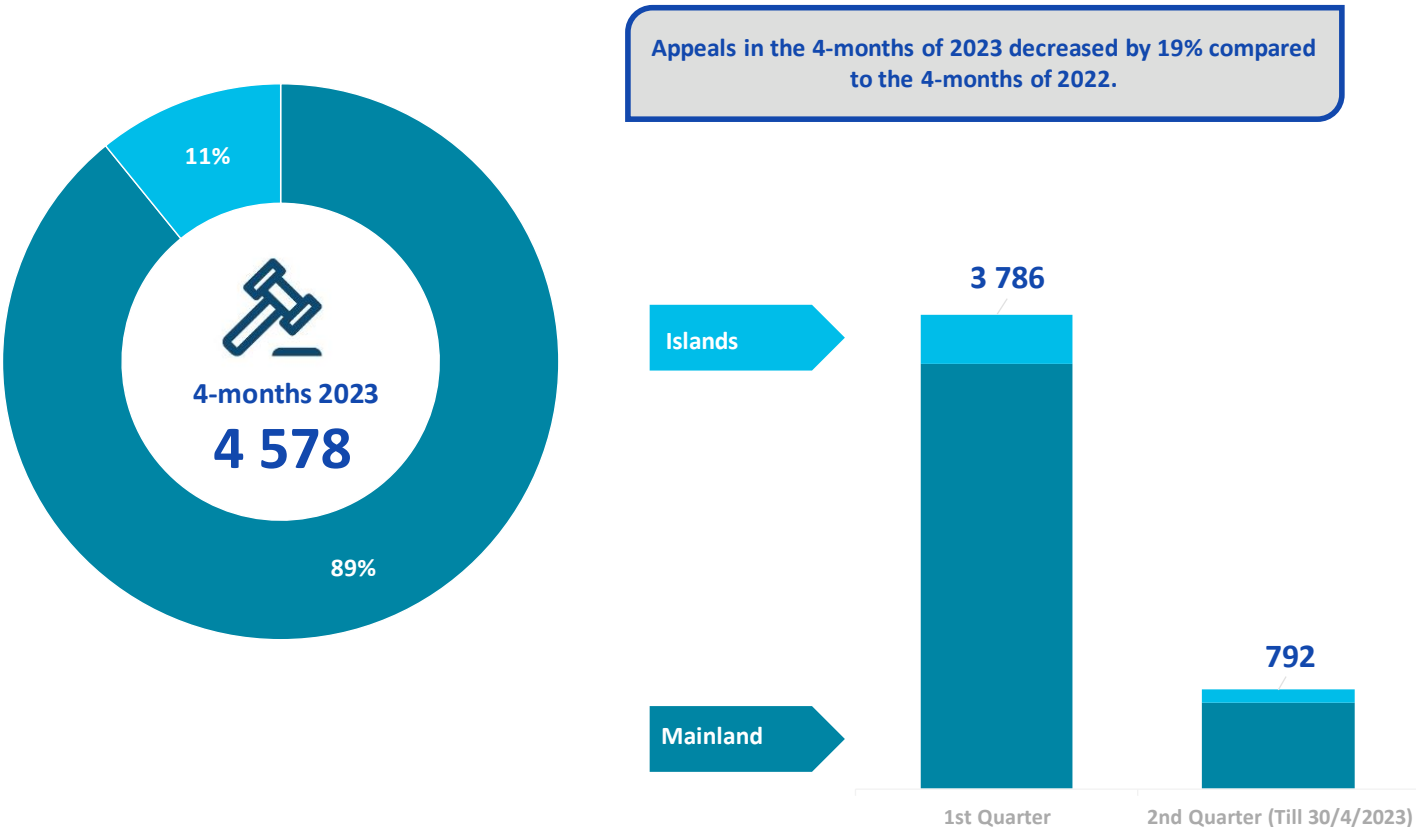


Chart 16. Appeals that have been lodged the 4-months of 2023 per location and quarter – See Appendix Table 10a

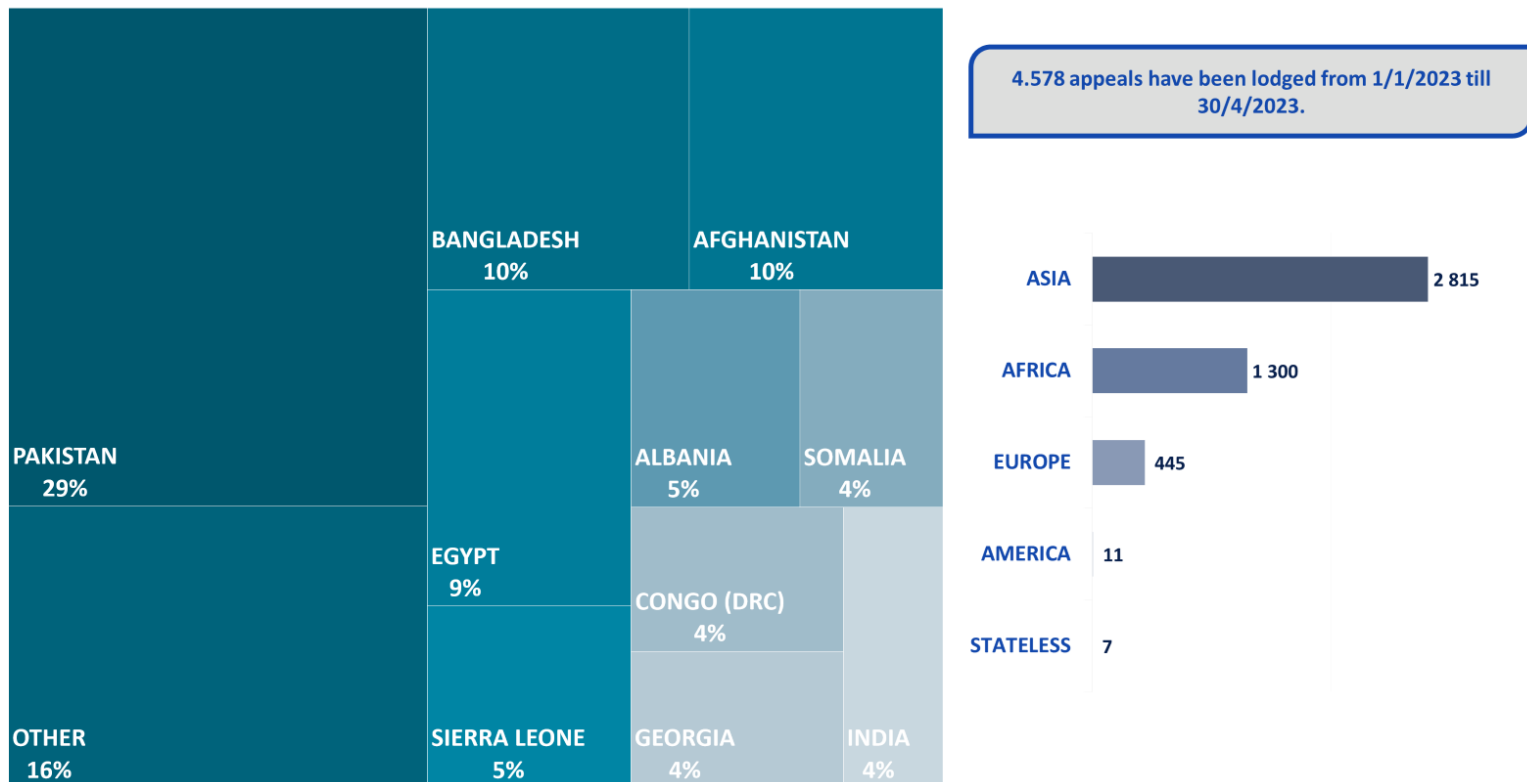

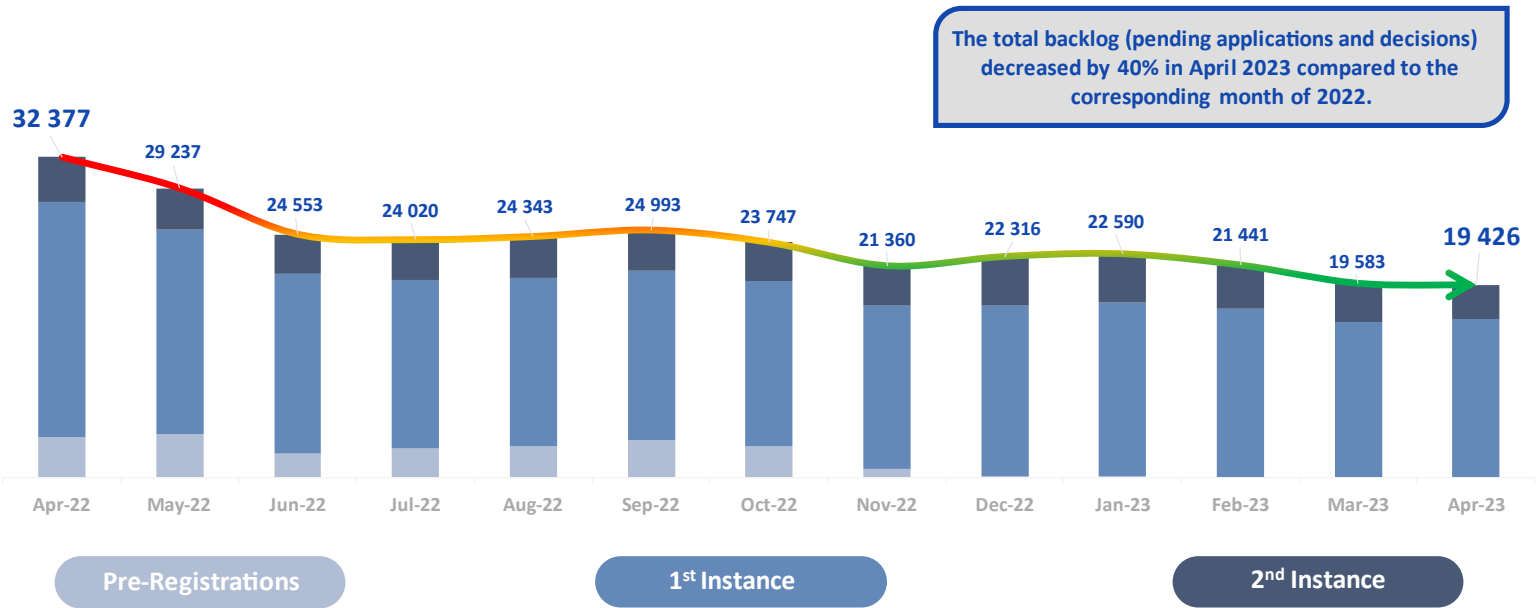

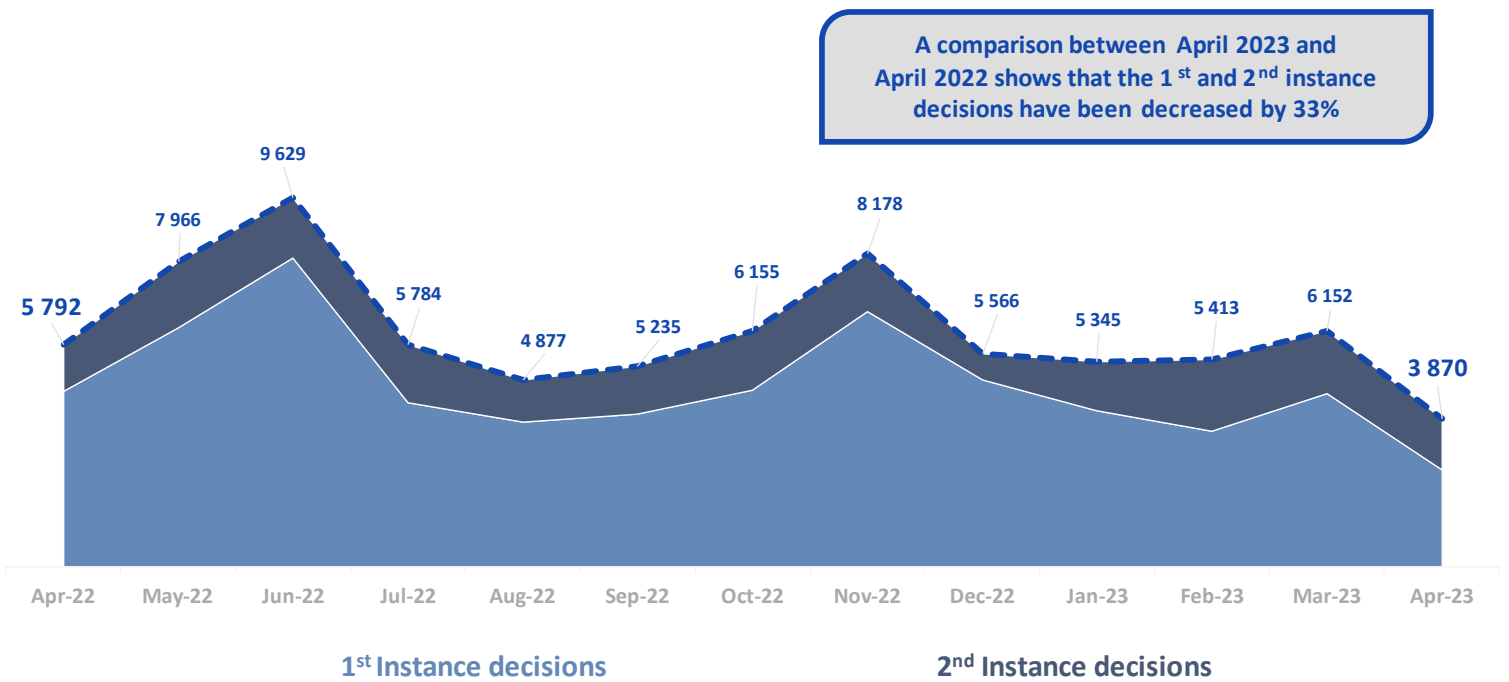


Chart 19. Aggregate Decisions issued in 1st and 2nd Instance per month - See Appendix Table 11a

- The average time for a 2nd Instance decision to be issued is 91 days since the date of appeal lodging, while it is 52 days from the date of appeal discussion.
- The total of pending decisions of Appeals Authority (3.372 pending) consists of cases that have been discussed till April 2023 (2.041 pending) or are scheduled to be discussed till July 2023 (1.331 pending).

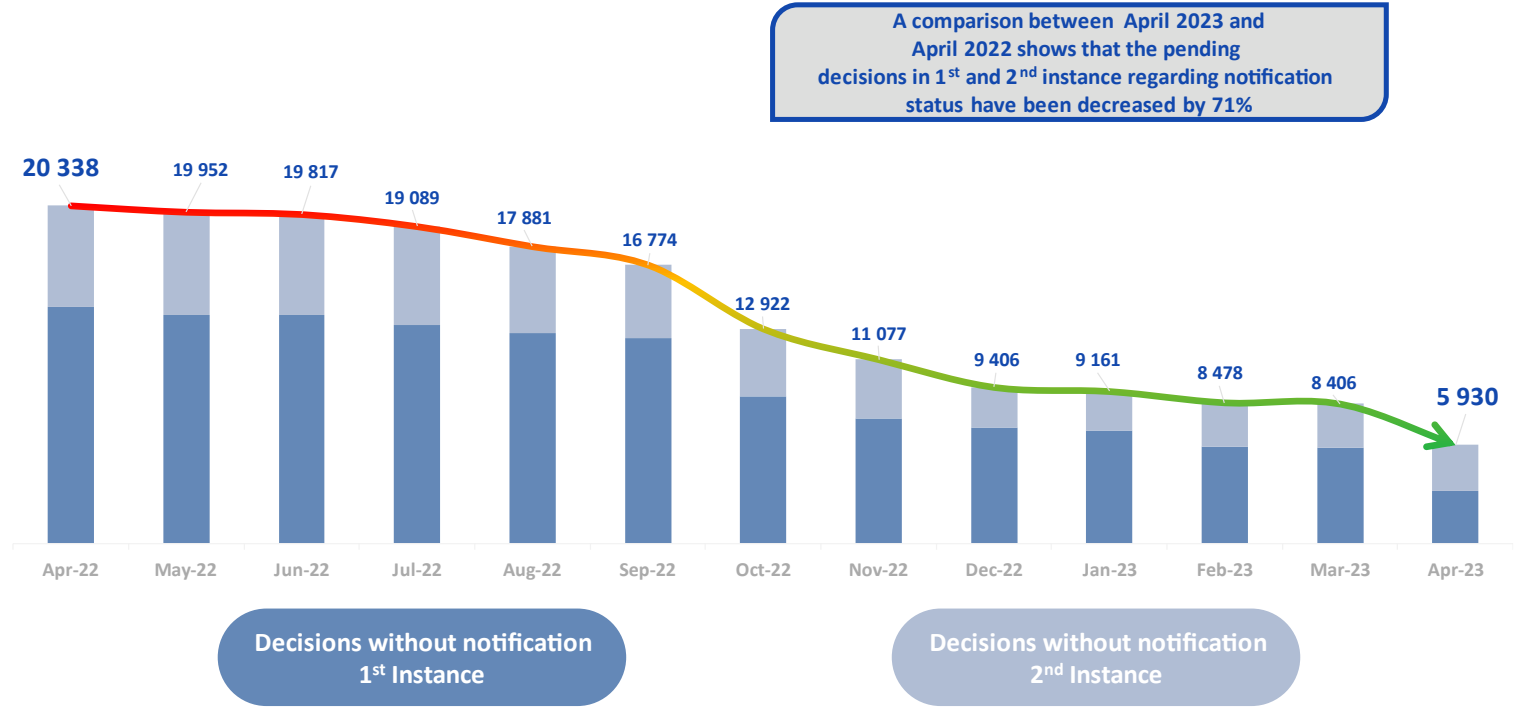


Chart 20. Aggregate pending decisions in 1st and 2nd instance regarding notification status per month - See Appendix Table 11c

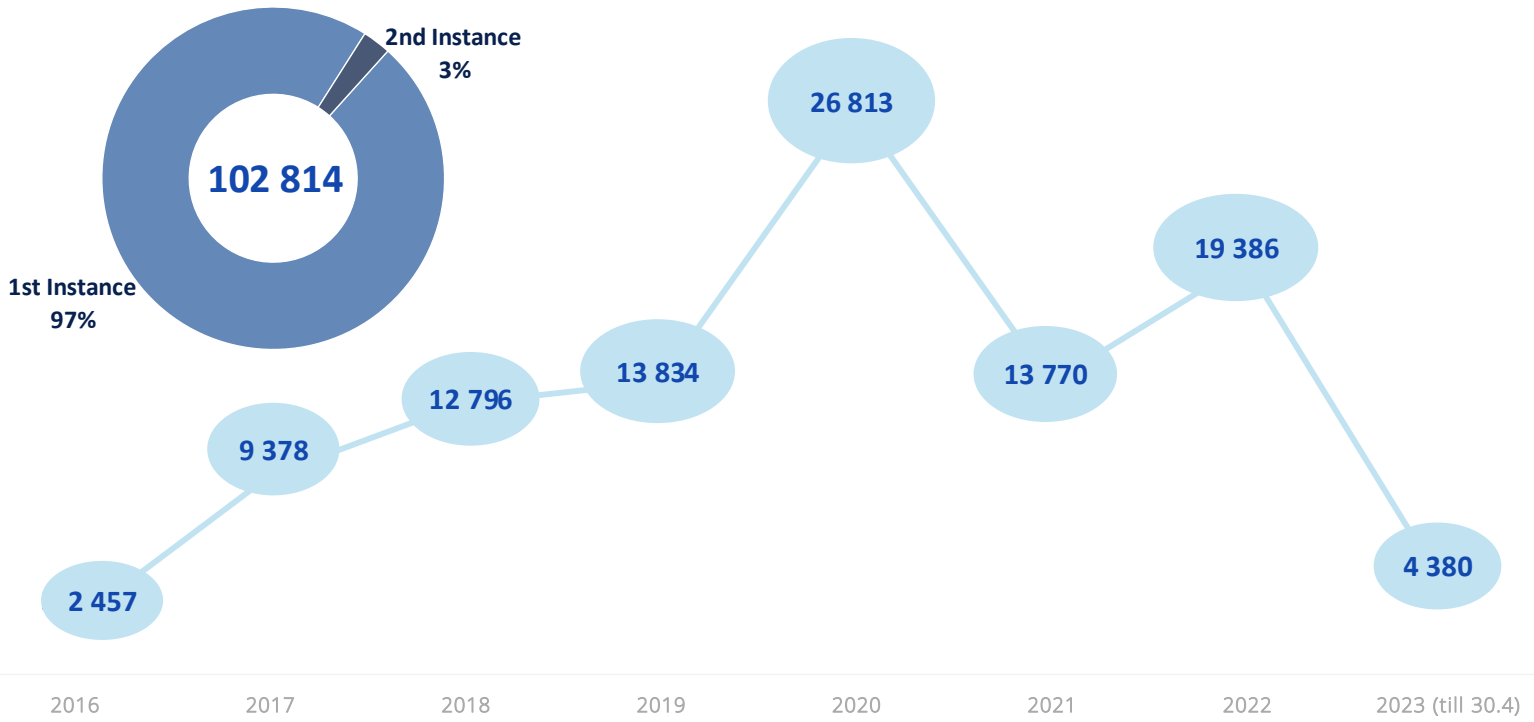

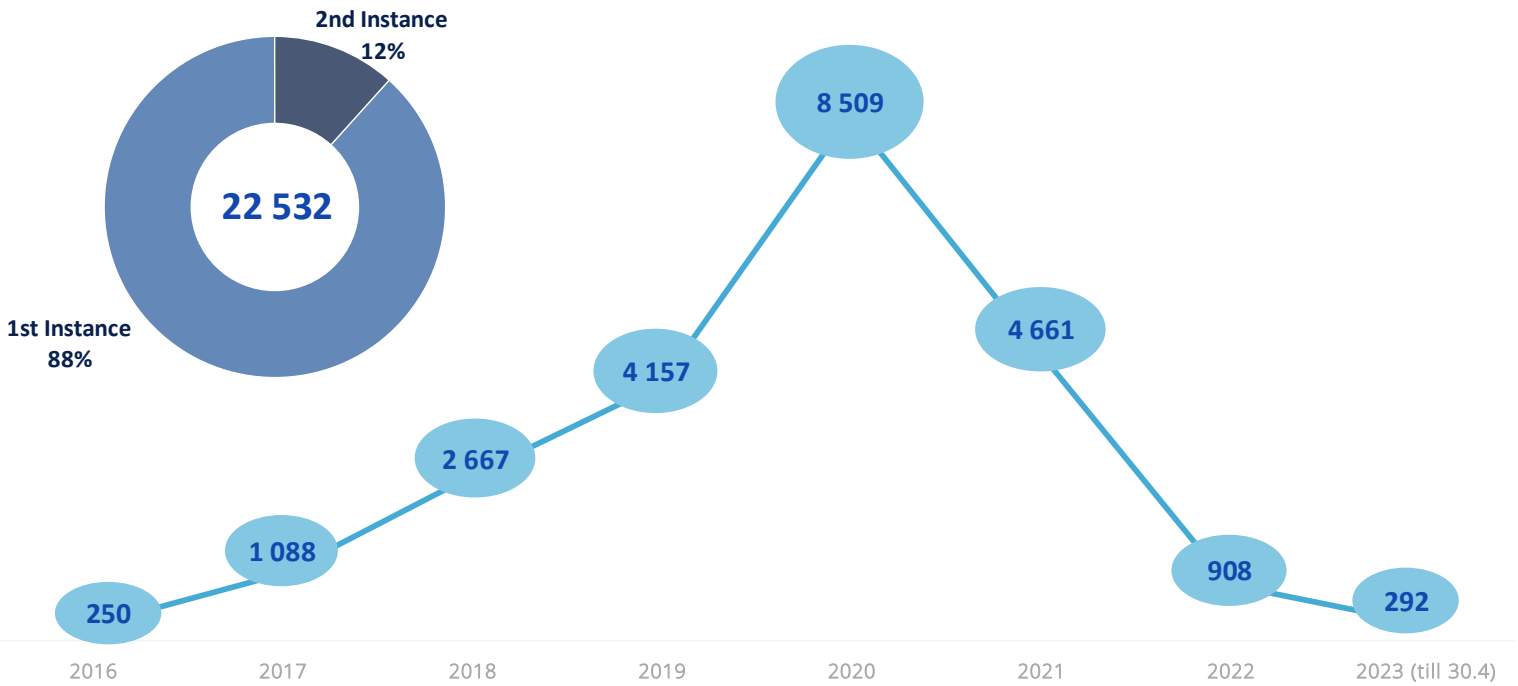
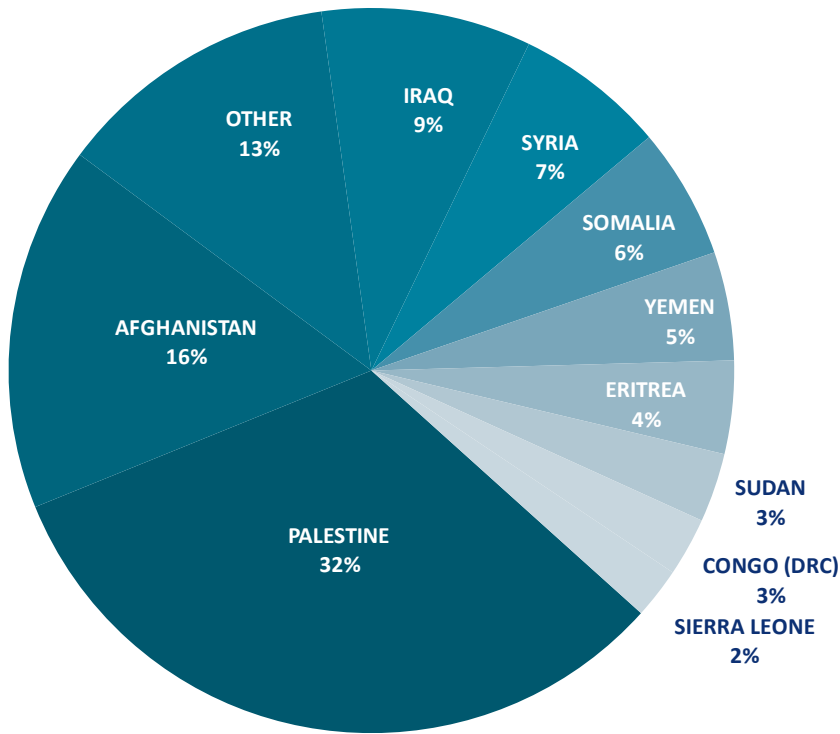

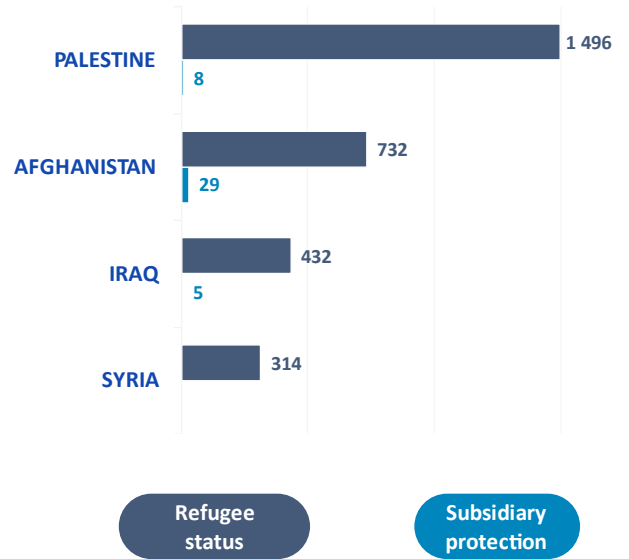

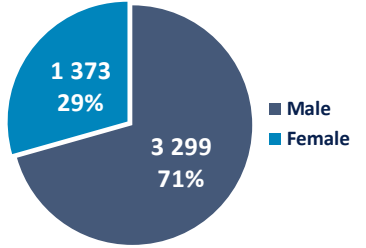
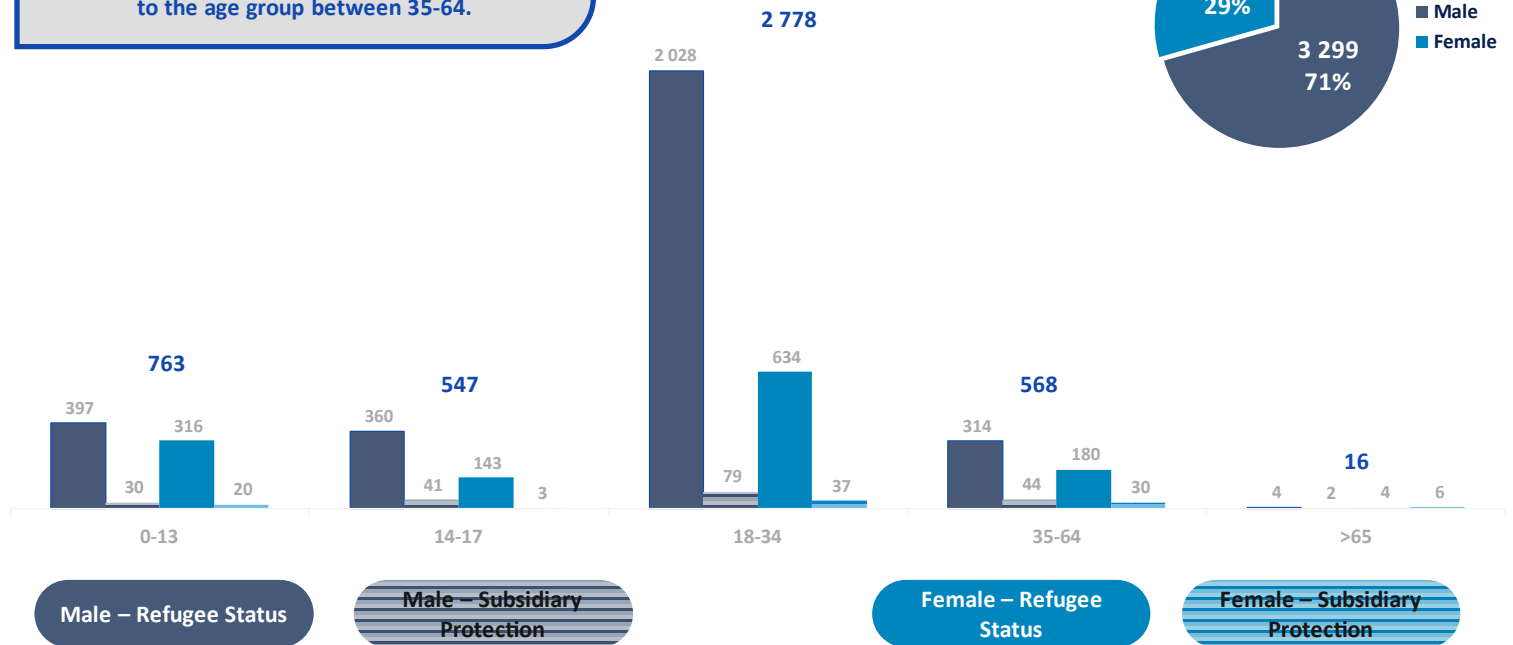

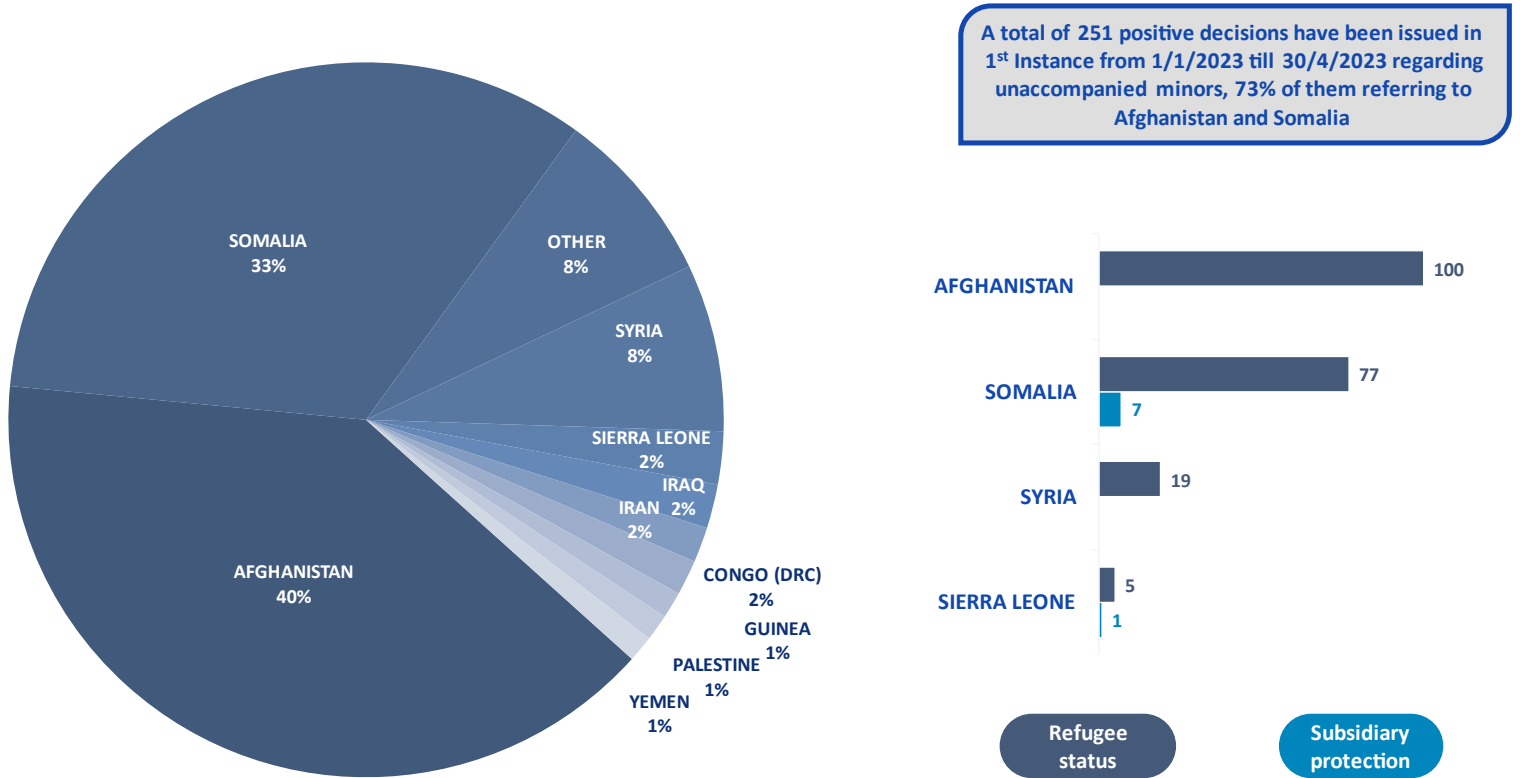

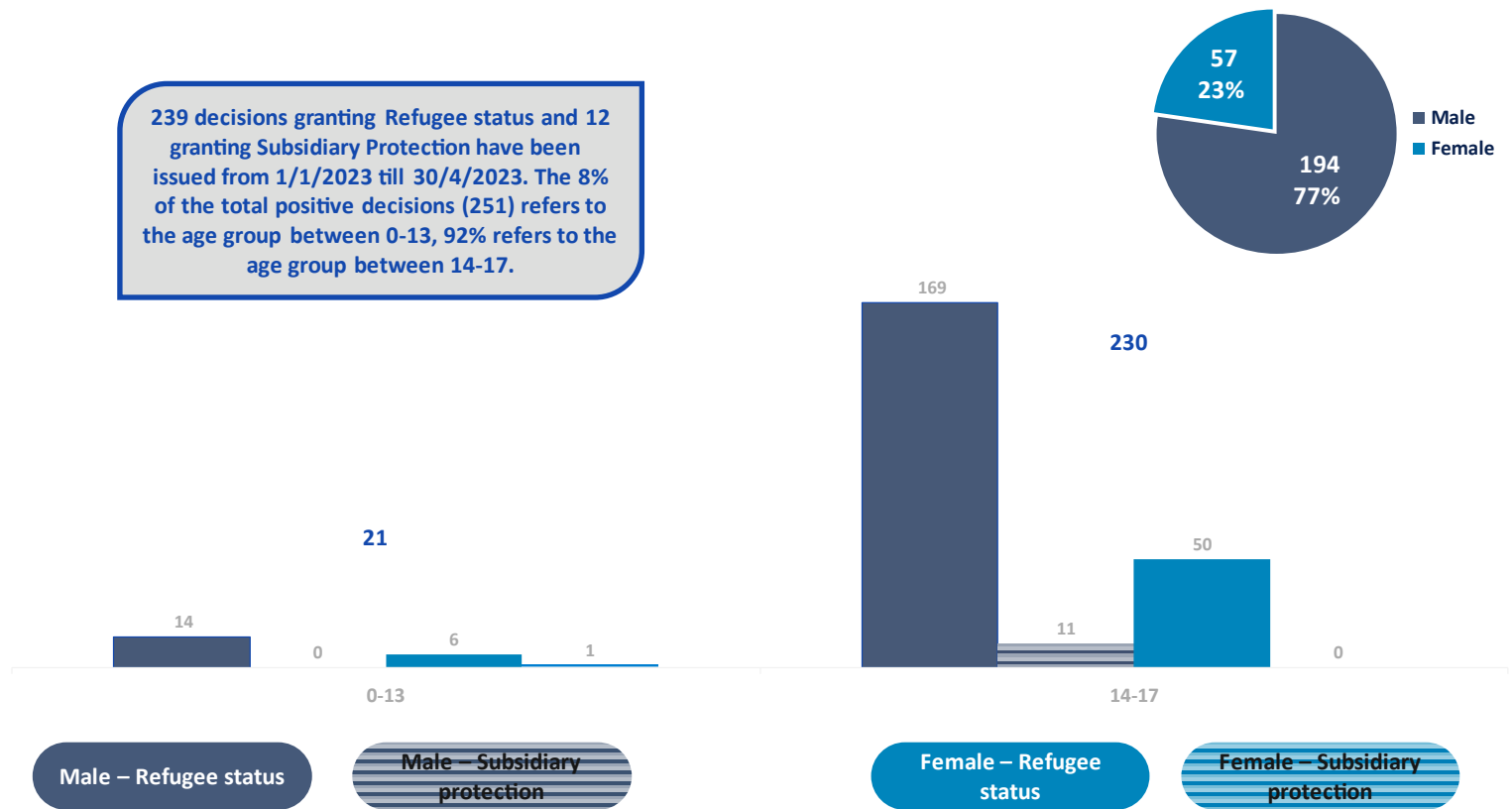

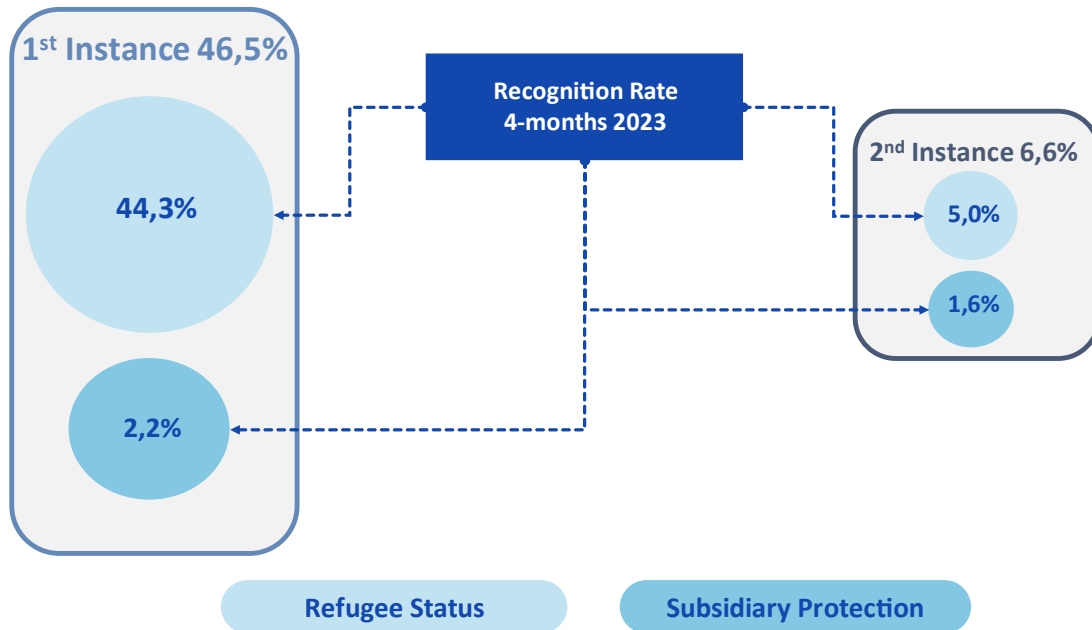


Chart 27. Recognition Rate in 1st & 2nd Instance. See Appendix Table 12g

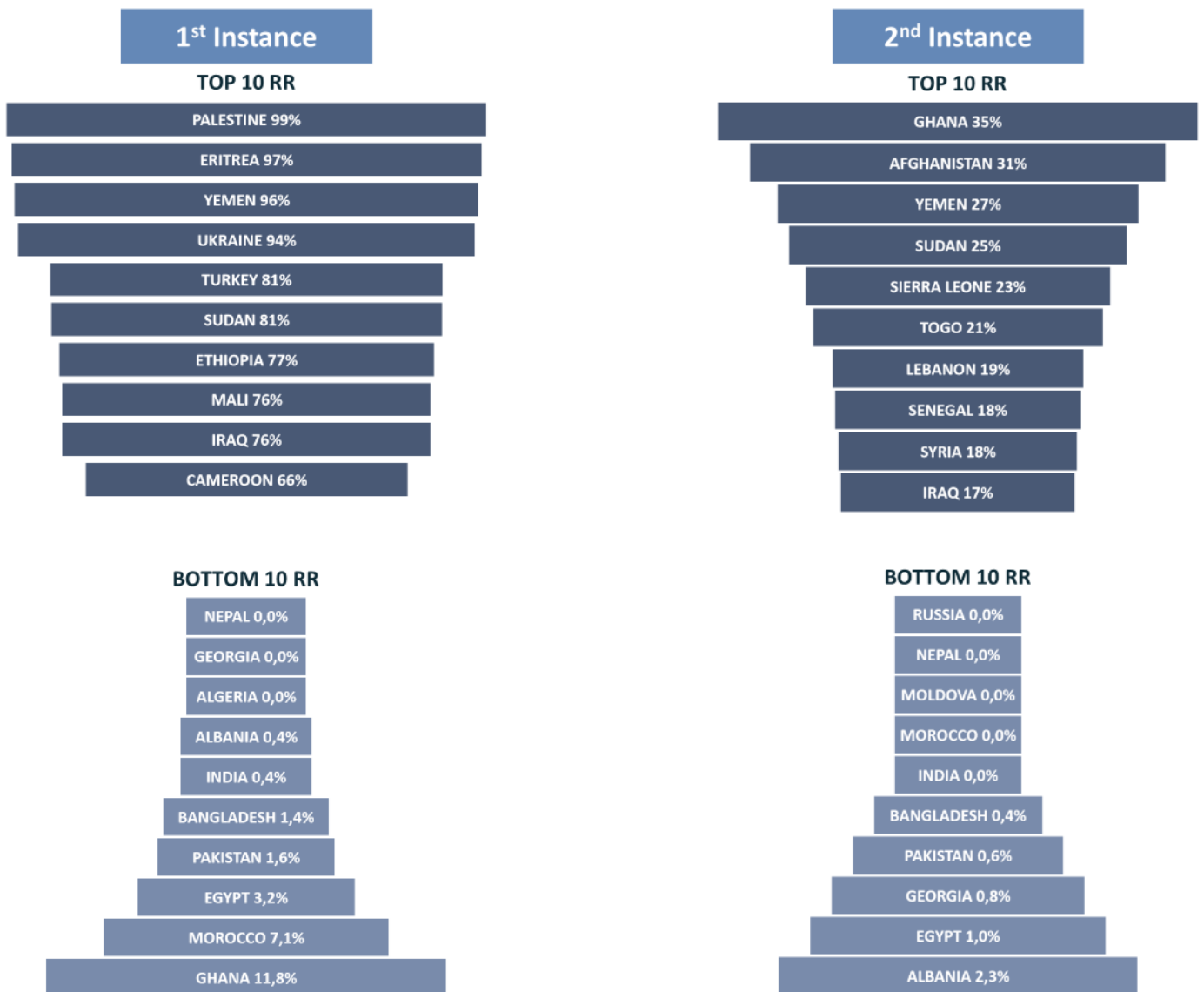

11. Applications for annulment of 2nd Instance Decisions before the Administrative Court

The 32% of the total applications for annulment per year of lodging (5.389) are pending while for the rest of them (68%), a decision has been issued. 3,76% of the decisions had a positive outcome and 96,24% were rejected.

From the total of 3.666 decisions regarding applications for annulment (per year of decision) 46% have been issued in 2022 and 2023.

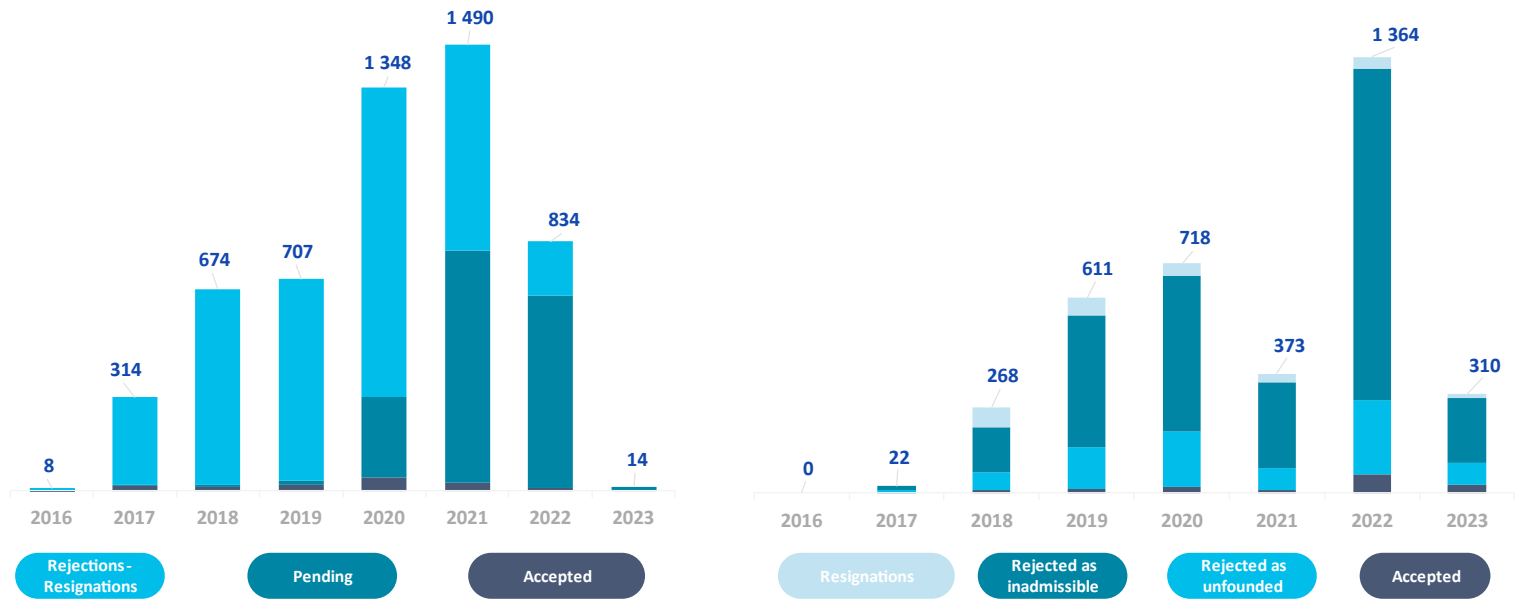

12. HELIOS Integration Program

The "Helios" program is funded by the European Union. Its purpose is to promote integration support for beneficiaries of International Protection and is implemented with:

- accommodation support
- through integration courses (learning the Greek language, enhancing social skills)
- Job counselling sessions
- raising awareness of the host Community and promoting social cohesion.

The Ministry of Immigration and Asylum monitors the implementation of the program, which is implemented by the International Organization for Migration. From 16/7/2019 until 30/4/2023 44.174 people have registered in the program, while 22.437 recognized refugees receive financial assistance for renting a house. It is worth noting that in April, 367 new leases were added to the accommodation support of the "Helios" program (regarding the period from 1/4/2023 till 30/4/2023). At the same time 9.631 beneficiaries of International Protection have been enrolled in the integration courses and 10.768 people are attending job counseling sessions.

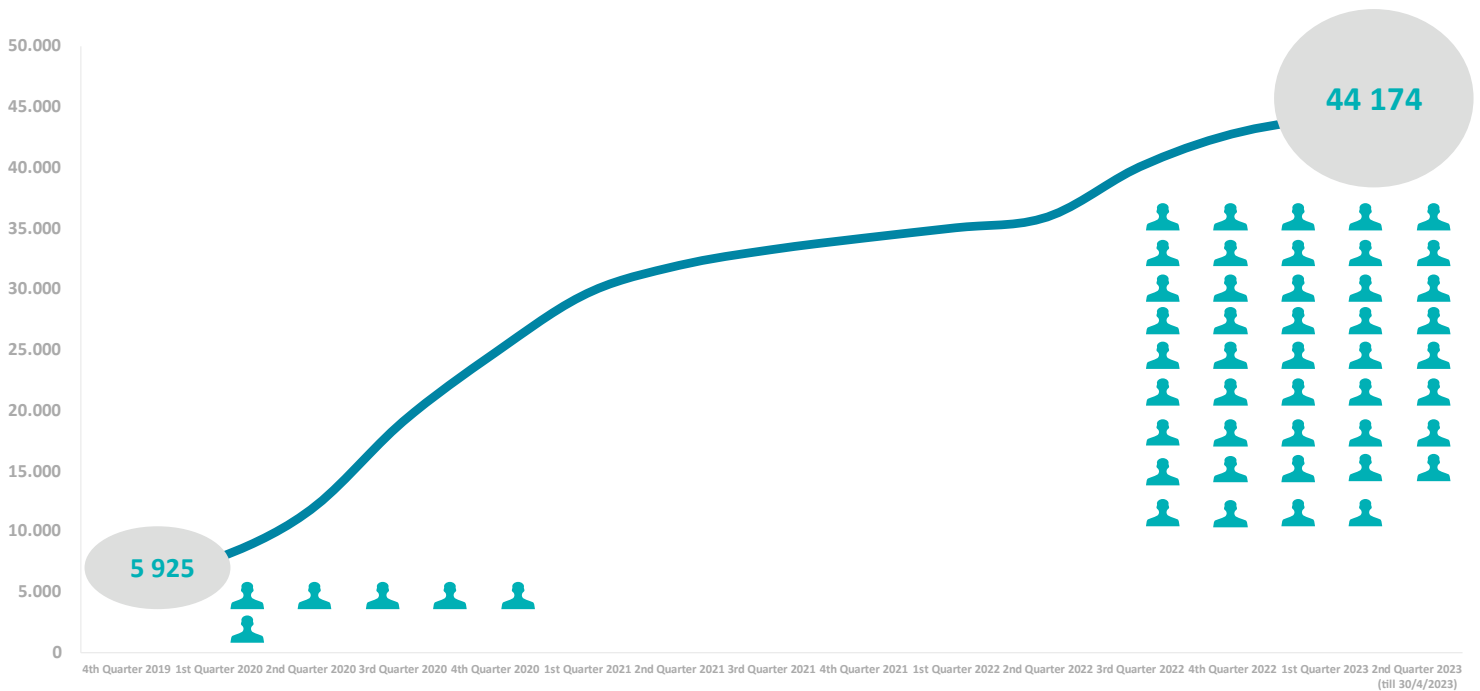


Chart 30. Helios Enrollments – See Appendix Table 14

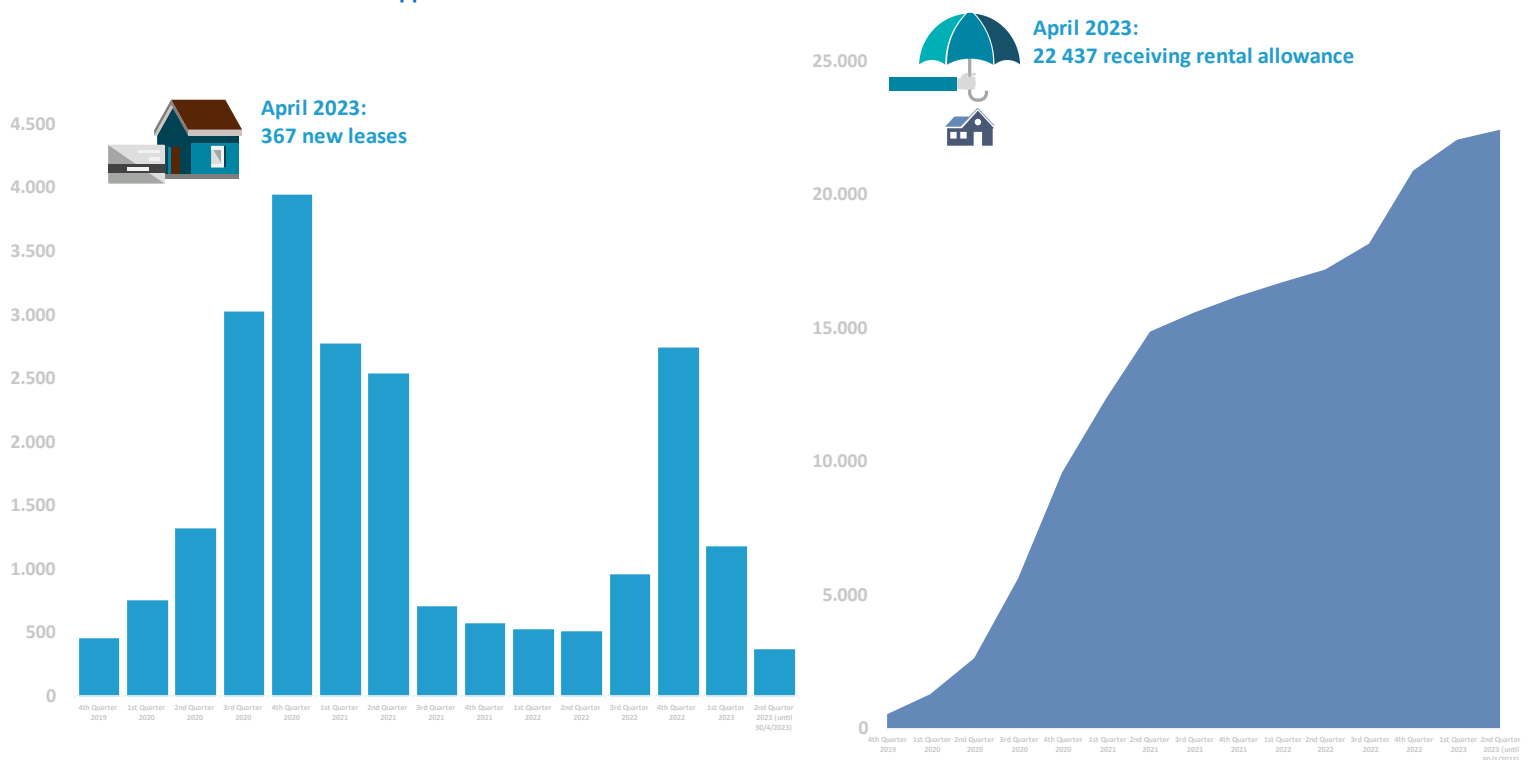


Chart 31. New leases (left), Receiving rental allowance (Right) - See Appendix Table 15 and 16

13. Returns - Departures

In April 2023 the departures from Greece to third countries outside the EU, as well as to member states of the European Union are the following:

- 254 forced deportations and returns of third country nationals, based on agreements of the European Union, but also bilateral agreements of our country.
- 255 voluntary departures through IOM.
- 52 voluntary departures of immigrants from our country to their countries of origin.
- Returns under the EU - Turkey Joint Declaration have not been made since April 2020 due to Covid-19. It should be noted that despite the lifting of the Covid-19 measures the requests of missions-returns of the Greek authorities have not been answered.
- A total of 461 people left the country in April, while 934 arrived.

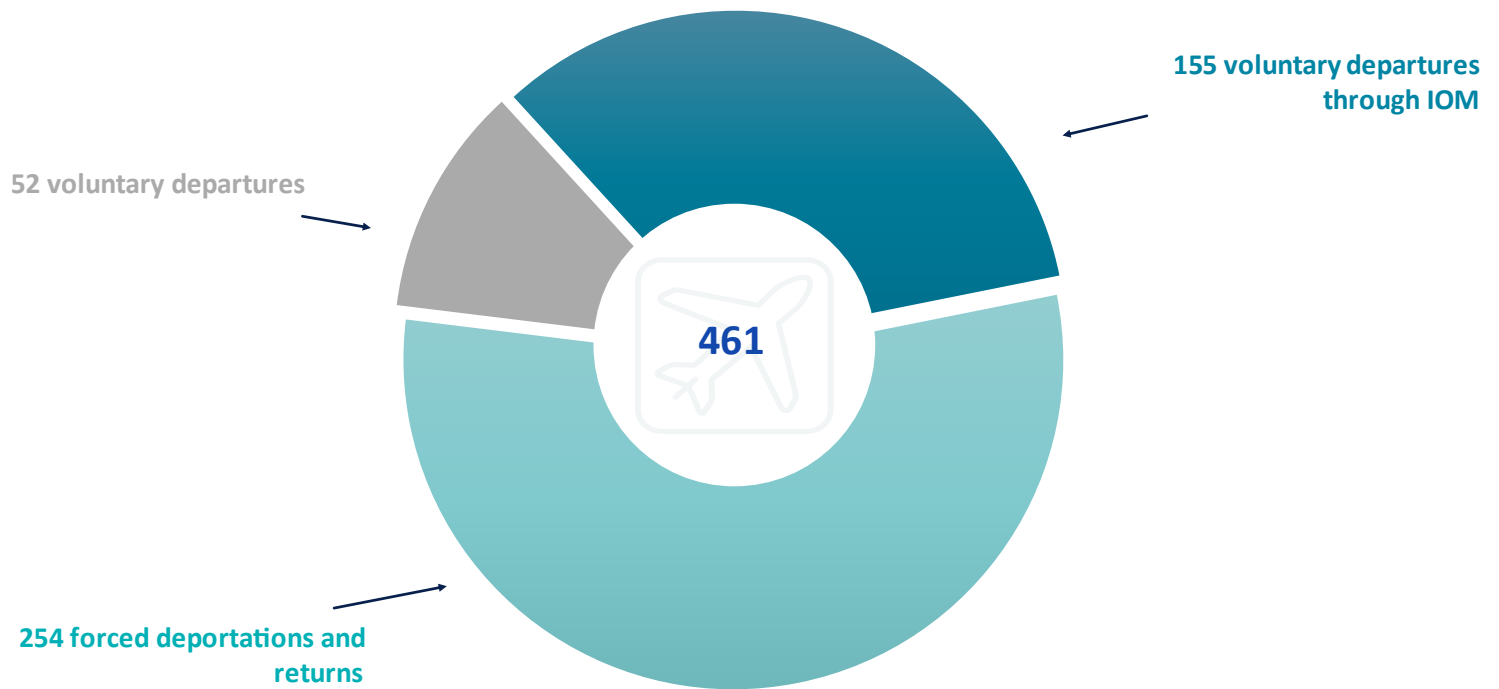


Chart 32. Returns-Departures – See Appendix Table 17

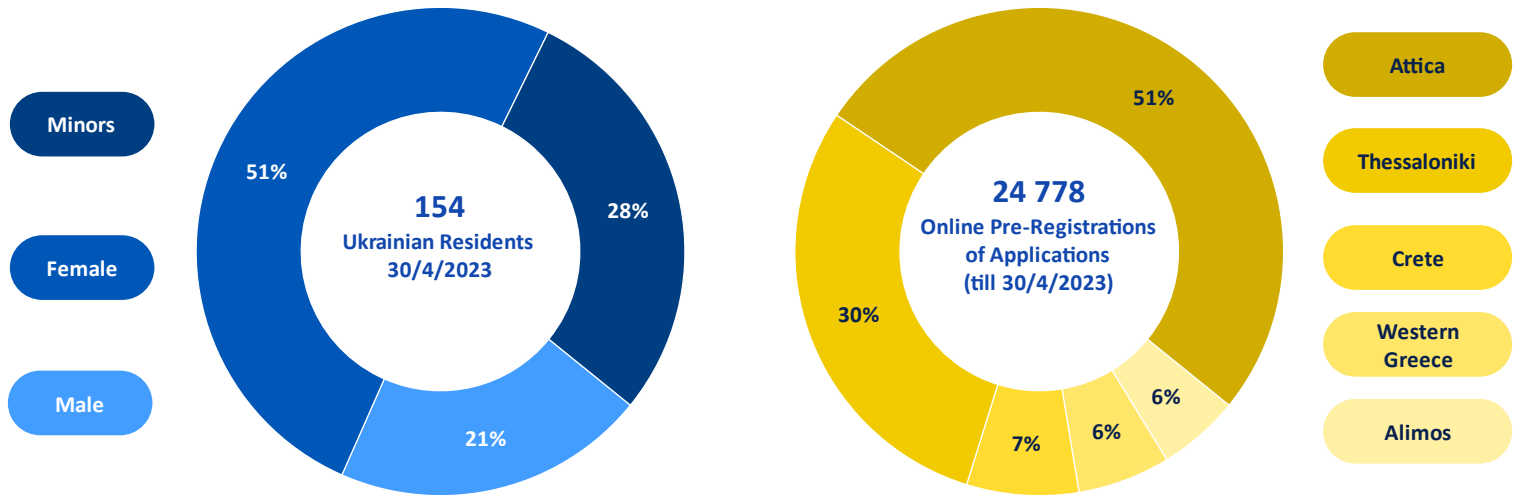


Chart 33. Total Ukrainian Residents & Online pre-registrations of applications (April 2023) - See Appendix Table 18 & 19

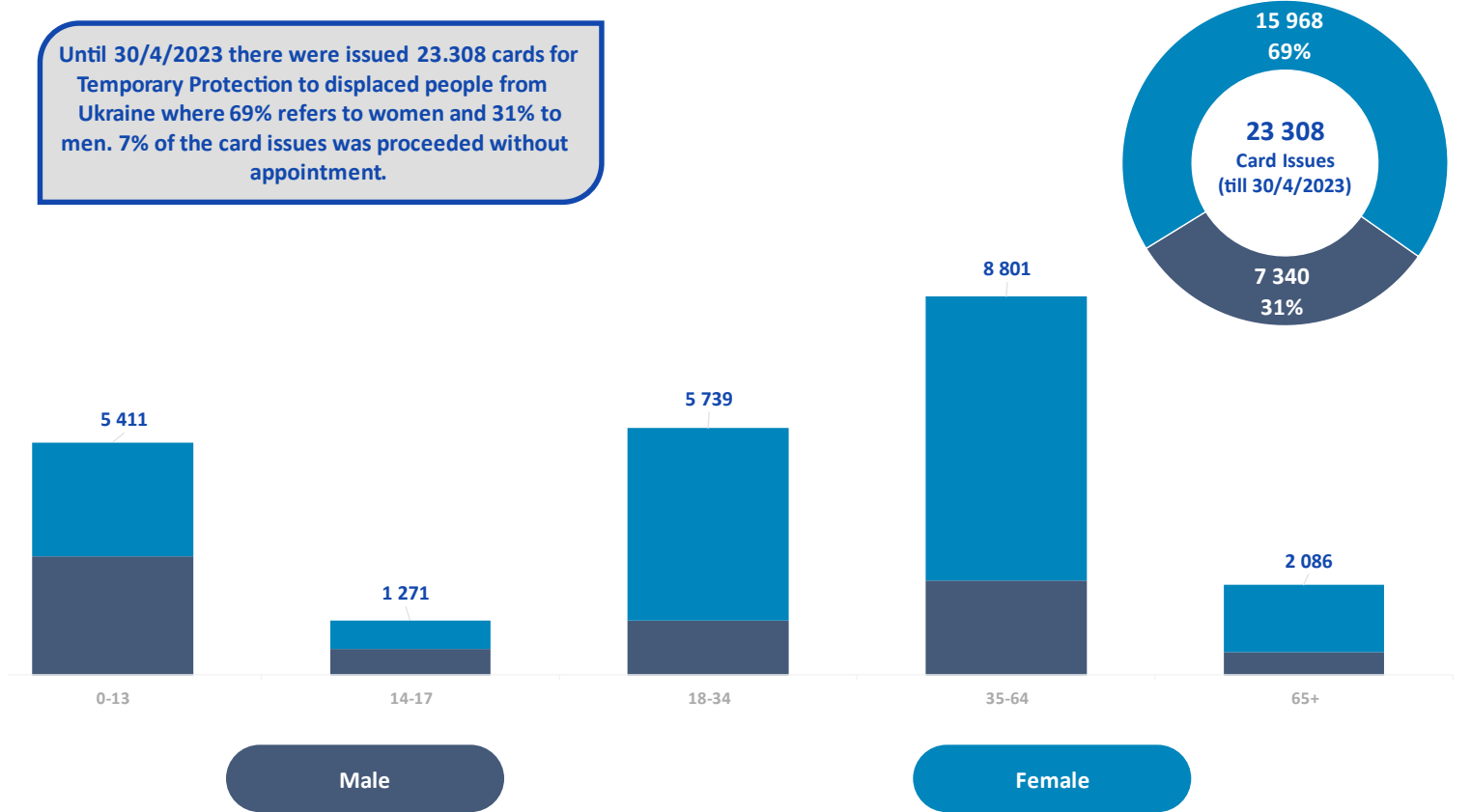


Chart 34. Total card issues to Ukrainians for Temporary Protection per age group and gender (April 2023) - See Appendix Table 20
