Arrivals decreased by 40% in February 2026 compared to the corresponding month of 2025.






Chart 1. Migration flows (islands of Eastern Aegean sea, Evros and Crete) February 2025 – February 2026 – See Appendix Table 1

Transfers in February 2026 decreased by 74% compared to the corresponding month of 2025.




Chart 2. Transfers of asylum seekers from the islands to the mainland February 2025 – February 2026 - See Appendix Table 2




Chart 3. Island Residents in total February 2025 – February 2026 - See Appendix Table 3

4. Distribution of Asylum Seekers per Region and Accommodation scheme







Chart 5. Distribution of Asylum Seekers per Region and Accommodation scheme – See Appendix Table 4 & 5




Chart 6. Applications for International Protection per year. For 2026 applications are calculated till the month of reference (February) - See Appendix Table 7a

5b. Applications for International Protection per Regional Office or Asylum Unit and per Region



5c. Applications for International Protection per month with distinction between first time and subsequent




Chart 8. Applications for International Protection per month with distinction between first time and subsequent (February 2025 - February 2026) - See Appendix Table 7c

5d. Applications for International Protection per nationality, gender and age group




Chart 9. Applications for International Protection 2-months 2026 per Nationality (Top 10 Nationalities and distribution per continent) - See Appendix Table 7d





Chart 10. Applications for International Protection 2-months 2026 per gender and age group - See Appendix Table 7e






6a. Type of Decisions – 1st Instance

9,378 decisions have been issued in the 1st Instance from 1/1/2026 till 28/2/2026. 40,2% of them are positive, 58,4% negative and 1,4% refers to other administrative decisions.





Chart 13. 2nd Instance Decisions per month and type for 2026 and for the month of reference (February 2026). - See Appendix Table 8b

Appeals in the 2-months of 2026 increased by 71% compared to the 2-months of 2025.






Chart 14. Appeals that have been lodged the 2-months of 2026 per location and quarter – See Appendix Table 9a



8a. Pending Pre-Registrations of applications for International Protection – Decisions issued in 1st and 2nd Instance

The total backlog (pending applications and decisions) increased by 10% in February 2026 compared to the corresponding month of 2025.



A comparison between February 2026 and February 2025 shows that the 1st and 2nd instance decisions have been decreased by 0,2%




Chart 17. Aggregate Decisions issued in 1st and 2nd Instance per month - See Appendix Table 10a

- The average time for a 2nd Instance decision to be issued is 88 days since the date of appeal lodging, while it is 50 days from the date of appeal discussion.
- The total of pending decisions of Appeals Authority (3.469 pending) consists of cases that have been discussed till February 2026 (2.132 pending) or are scheduled to be discussed till May 2026 (1.337 pending).

A comparison between February 2026 and February 2025 shows that the pending decisions in 1st and 2nd instance regarding notification status have been decreased by 26%




Chart 18. Aggregate pending decisions in 1st and 2nd instance regarding notification status per month - See Appendix Table 10c


















Chart 25. Recognition Rate in 1st & 2nd Instance. See Appendix Table 11g



10. Applications for annulment of 2nd Instance Decisions before the Administrative Court

The 17,2% of the total applications for annulment per year of lodging (6.751) are pending while for the rest of them (82,8%), a decision has been issued. 5,7% of the decisions had a positive outcome and 94,3% were rejected.

From the total of 5.592 decisions regarding applications for annulment (per year of decision) 40% have been issued in 2023, 2024 and 2025.




11a. HELIOS+ Integration Program (Integrated Actions for the Integration of Third-Country Nationals into the Labor Market)

The HELIOS+ program has been implemented since 1/1/2025 by the International Organization for Migration (IOM) across all regions of the country, through its integration into the Regional Operational Programs and with funding from the European Social Fund Plus (ESF+).

It is addressed to beneficiaries of international and temporary protection, aiming to support their independent living and social integration process through the provision of the following integrated services:

- support for independent living
- integration counseling
- Greek language courses
- facilitation of access to the labor market
- awareness-raising among the local community and promotion of social cohesion

The Ministry of Migration and Asylum, through the Directorate of Social Integration, monitors the implementation of the HELIOS+ program's activities, as reflected in the relevant monthly Factsheets published by the Implementing Agency on the program's official website.

From 1/1/2025 till 28/2/2026, 2.258 beneficiaries have been enrolled in the program. Among them, 1.134 beneficiaries have received rental subsidies, 1.373 have received integration counseling services, and 1.259 have received employment counseling services.





Chart 28. Helios+ Enrollments per quarter. See Appendix Table 13

11b. HELIOS JUNIOR Integration Program (Integrated Actions for the Integration of Third-Country Nationals into the Labor Market)

The HELIOS Junior programme has been implemented since 1/10/2024 by the International Organization for Migration (IOM), in cooperation with experienced implementing partners and with funding from the European Union's Asylum, Migration and Integration Fund (AMIF).

It is addressed to third-country nationals aged 18–21 who legally reside in Greece and arrived in the country as unaccompanied minors, with the aim of supporting them during their exit from previous accommodation facilities, ensuring a smooth transition to independent living conditions, and facilitating their integration into Greek society and the labour market.

In summary, the services provided to the programme's beneficiaries include:

- accommodation in rented and fully furnished apartments and support for independent living
- development of an individual integration plan and continuous monitoring and support throughout the integration process
- individual counselling, referral to formal education and training providers for attendance of Greek language courses and vocational training programmes, and support in the certification of knowledge and skills
- provision of a monthly cash allowance to cover basic needs

The Ministry of Migration and Asylum, through the Directorate of Social Integration, monitors the implementation of the physical scope of the HELIOS Junior programme, as recorded and presented in the monthly Factsheets published by the Implementing Body on the programme's official website.

From 1/1/2025 till 28/2/2026, a total of 411 individuals have been enrolled in the programme.

(As of 1/2/ 2026, the enrollment of new beneficiaries in the program has been discontinued, with the exception of certain cases involving vulnerable individuals. However, the program continues to be implemented until its scheduled end date for those beneficiaries who are already enrolled)





Chart 30. Helios Junior Enrollments per quarter. See Appendix Table 15



75% of the total 411 registered beneficiaries from 1/1/2025 till 28/2/2026 come from Egypt, Somalia and Afghanistan.




Chart 31. Helios Junior Enrollments per nationality and age. See Appendix Table 16

12. Returns - Departures

In February 2026 the departures from Greece to third countries outside the EU, as well as to member states of the European Union are the following:

- 172 forced deportations and returns of third country nationals, based on agreements of the European Union, but also bilateral agreements of our country.
- 166 voluntary departures through IOM.
- 92 voluntary departures of immigrants from our country to their countries of origin.
- 95 transfers to Member States of the European Union under the Dublin Regulation.
- Returns under the EU - Turkey Joint Declaration have not been made since March 2020 due to Covid-19. It should be noted that despite the lifting of the Covid-19 measures the requests of missions-returns of the Greek authorities have not been answered.
- A total of 525 people left the country in February, while 1.552 arrived.





Chart 32. Returns-Departures – See Appendix Table 17.




Chart 33. Total Ukrainian Residents & Online pre-registrations of applications (February 2026) - See Appendix Table 18

Until 28/2/2026 there were issued 38.467 cards for Temporary Protection to displaced people from Ukraine where 70% refers to women and 30% to men.





Chart 34. Total card issues to Ukrainians for Temporary Protection per age group and gender (February 2026) - See Appendix Table 19




Chart 35. Migration flows in rest of country by sea (1/1/2026-28/2/2026) - See Appendix Table 20
